New Nazareth College Opens On Jan. 19

women, six laymen, three priests, and twenty-two sisters, holding doctorates and masters from Oxford, the Sorbonne, Fribourg, Catholic University, Fordham, Columbia, Cornell and Harvard.

Nazareth College is incorporated under the legislature of New York State, is registered by the University of the State of New York, and is empowered to confer the degree of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science. It is an accredited member of the National Catholic Educational Association; of the Association of Colleges of the State of New York; the Middle States Association of Colleges; the American Council of Education, and the Association of American Colleges.

COURSES OFFERED

The Arts Course leading to the degree Bachelor of Arts, with an academic major and minor, or with a major in speech, social science and fine arts, is offered by the College.

The Science Course, leading to the degree Bachelor of Science, offers many majors, one of the most important being chemistry. A five year curriculum for Bachelor of Science in Nursing is offered. These courses are pursued at Nazareth College and St. Joseph's Hospital School of Nursing at Elmira.

The course leading to the degree Bachelor of Science with a major in Music, aims to give the student the broad culture of the studies of the Art Course together with the special culture and technique provided by the courses in music. The course aims to fit the students for teaching music in the public schools, and for private teaching. It also offers special students' opportunities for the study of music as a purely cultural subject.

BUSINESS STUDIES

For students who, with their background of College education and culture, wish to enter the business profession, the course leading to the degree Bachelor of Science with a major in Secretarial Studies, is offered. This course is intended to give the technical knowledge and skill with which her broader education, will fit the student to fill the more important positions in the business world.

A full course in the Science of Education is given for those aiming to enter the teaching profession. These studies in education are taken as electives by the students in the arts, secretarial and music departments. The required observation and teaching are done in the Public High Schools of Rochester. The student who completes this course in Education is entitled to a College Graduate Provisional Certificate. This certificate is a license to teach in the High Schools in the State of New York.

All of the courses prescribe a certain amount of work in Language and Literature, History, Science, Philosophy and Religion. The administration of the college, in order to give the students as much opportunity for self-government as seemed advisable and in the belief that such opportunity would increase the spirit of loyalty and responsibility among the students and develop their character and sense of civic duty, allowed the Undergraduate Association to formulate its own policies and plans in conjunction with the college.

Since extra-curricular activities are deemed next in importance to scholastic achievements, students are encouraged to join clubs and to participate in class functions. All of the students belong to the Sodality, and are interested in the Catholic Student Mission Crusade. Red Cross First Aid groups have been organized and over half of the students at one particular time were knitting for the Red Cross. Among the more active clubs are the Debate Club, the International Relations Club, the Glee Club, the Orchestra, the Press Bureau, the Dramatic Club, and the Dante Club.

The Gleaner, which is the bi-weekly newspaper, and Verity Fair, a literary quarterly and member of the National Scholastic Press Association and winner of All American Honors and All Catholic Honors, are published by the students.
