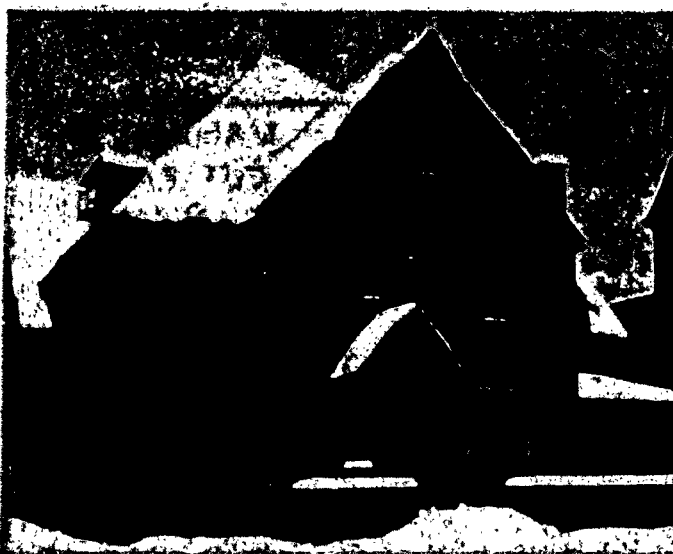

St. Mary's Hospital Drive Opens Jan. 22

The new hospital is scheduled for completion late this year. Begun last spring, its construction was threatened by the defense emergency until Donald Nelson, director of priorities, proclaimed it a defense project, granting it a status only slightly removed from guns, tanks and battleships. It is estimated that the complete hospital will cost \$1,300,000. A portion of this cost has been met from a building fund, accumulated over a long period of years in the form of gifts and bequests, that made the preliminary construction work possible.

Campaigners pointed out today that the \$275,000 sought in the campaign late this month represents only a fraction of the total cost of the project, and that Rochester has the opportunity of obtaining a badly-needed new hospital at a bargain rate.

FR. KEENAN, VICINTIAN PRIEST, DIES AT 51
