Cites State's Right, Duty in Labor Acts

The right and duty of the State to enact labor legislation was discussed by Doctor Aaron S. Abell, Ph. D., at the opening session of the second semester of the Rochester Catholic Labor College, held Friday evening, Jan. 9, at St. Joseph's House of Hospitality. This is the first of a series of lectures on recent labor legislation in America. Dr. Abell is the head of the history department at Nazareth College.

Regarding Labor Legislation, Dr. Abell quoted from Pope Leo XIII's encyclical on The Condition of Labor: "Whenever the general interest of any particular class suffers, or is threatened with, evils which can in no other way be met, the public authority must step in to meet them. . . Rights must be religiously respected wherever they are found; and it is the duty of the public authority to prevent and punish injury, and to protect each one in the possession of his own. Still, when there is question of protecting the rights of individuals, the poor and helpless have a claim to special consideration. The richer population have many ways of protecting themselves, and stand less in need of help from the State; those who are badly off have no resources of their own to fall back upon, and must chiefly rely upon the assistance of the State. And it is for this reason that wage-earners, who are undoubtedly among the weak and necessitous, should be specially cared for and protected by the commonwealth."

Ownership was the subject of the first of a series of talks given by the Rev. George E. Vogt, M.A., director of the Labor College. Father Vogt uses as his text Dom Virgil Michel's booklet on The Social Question.

The next session of the Labor College will be held on Friday, Jan. 16, from 8 until 10 p. m., at St. Joseph's House of Hospitality. An informal half-hour period of discussion will follow each lecture. William Scheib of Holy Apostles Parish will preside.

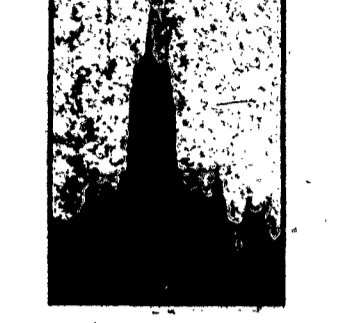

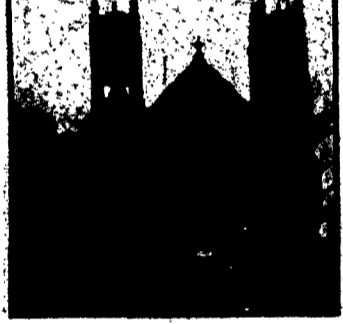
