My dear People:





LONDON.-(NC)-Catholics living in Polish territory incorporated in the Reich have been ordered to give up all prayerbooks, according to a report issued here by the Polish Institute of the Sword of the Snirit

It is stated that the official explanation of this Nazi decree is that Polish prayerbooks contain two hymns, which are sung to hational tunes. The same authority states that the order restricting Mass and the administration of the Sacraments to Poles are being enforced with greater severity, and that throughout the "General Government" area all church bells have been confiscated and that the Gracow Chapter, which protested the order, has been arrested.
