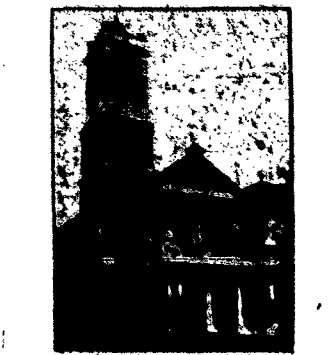

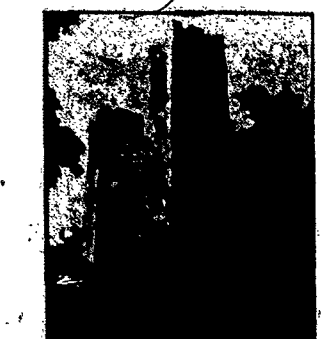

Publish Bibliography Of Economics Works

WASHINGTON.—(NC)—A bibliography of works on economics by Catholic writers, compiled in commemoration of the fiftieth anniversary of Pope Leo XIII's great social Encyclical *Rerum Novarum*, on the condition of labor, will be published this month by the Catholic University of America Press. Dedicated to the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John A. Ryan, Director of the Social Action Department of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, and comprising some 700 titles, including books and pamphlets, the volume has been prepared by Dr. Paul J. FitzPatrick, professor of economics at the Catholic University, and the Rev. Cletus F. Dirksen, O.P.S., professor of economics at St. Joseph's College, Collegeville, Ind.
