St. Louis U. Students Are Recalled Among Earliest Paratroops

ST. LOUIS.—St. Louis University students were among the earliest parachute-jumping soldiers in the history of military art. Following U. S. entry into the first World War, Maj. Albert Bond Lambert, an alumnus of St. Louis University and then national commander of the Balloon Corps, issued an invitation to university students to enroll in the balloon officer training classes and preliminary practice was held in a park. Upon completion of the course in St. Louis, students were transferred for actual parachute jumping at Omaha. There they underwent 4,000-foot drops, especially dangerous then, considering the primitive equipment.

University historians recall the case of Leo Ferrerbach, a St. Louis U. student, who bailed out of his bullet-riddled balloon over France. In those days parachuting soldiers were rewarded with six weeks' leave after each jump. Ferrerbach, however, was awarded heroic honors for bravery beyond the call of duty for waiving his leave in favor of ascending again for further action.

In the future, the International Morse Code will be required for all second class, first class, and Merit Badge Signaling. This recommendation was made in connection with the War Service Program, which was approved at the last meeting of the Executive Board of the Rochester Council. The adoption of one standard code of signaling will insure Rochester of a more uniform communication system among Scouts during an emergency. All Scouts are now asked to learn this code and use it for the duration of the emergency.

Some 80,000 Air Raid Posters were distributed by the Rochester Scouts throughout the city on last Saturday.
