WASHINGTON, (NC) — The needs of clergymen will be placed on a par with those of doctors and other "essential services" in administration of the tire-rationing program, Price Administrator Leon Henderson has announced.

Provisions are now being drafted, Mr. Henderson said, under which clergymen of all denominations who use automobiles in carrying on their ministry will be allowed to buy new tires. The new provisions will become a part of the tire-rationing order.

### PRAYER FOR OUR SOLDIERS

Do thou by Thy grace fortify them against the contagion of bad example, that being preserved from vice, and serving Thee faithfully they may be ready to meet death whenever it may happen, through Jesus Christ Our Lord Amen.

Sacred Heart of Jesus! Inspire them with sorrow for sin and grant them pardon.

Mother of God! Be with them on the battlefield during life, and at the hour of death, and obtain for them that they may die in the grace of Thy Son. Amen.

## Work With God To Meet Crisis—Taylor

NEW YORK. — Men facing "cold and stern and cruel" realities of the present should not "sit idly by, impotently complaining and criticizing, and still expect our burdens to be lifted by God—or indeed by anyone," Myron C. Taylor, President Roosevelt's personal representative at the Vatican, declared here Sunday.

Mr. Taylor spoke at the annual Communion Breakfast of the Carroll Club, Catholic business and professional women's organization, following corporate Communion at

St. Patrick's Cathedral in which 1,200 members participated. Mr. Taylor said "it is disloyal to the Omnipotent Power which created and endowed our world and gave us life upon the earth not to put to the best use the facilities which we are privileged to possess and thereby exercise the evil and protect the good."

"The supreme duty of all of us," he added, "is to exert ourselves to the utmost, to thrust from the world the responsibility of hate and revenge, and in its place to

## Congressmen Denounce Employing Communists In Government Posts

WASHINGTON—Employment of Communists and Socialists in high Government positions was vigorously attacked in addresses made on the floor of the United States House of Representatives this week.

Representative Clara E. Hoffman, of Michigan, and Representative Leland M. Ford, of California, made the attacks, both drawing attention to the fact that Malcolm Cowley, described as a former member of the editorial board of the Communist Daily Worker, is now employed as a writer and analyst in the Office of Emergency Management, at a salary of \$8,000 a year, and that Joseph P. Lash, former leader of the American Student Union and accused before the Dies Committee of being a Communist fellow-traveler, is a member of the Advisory Committee, Division of Youth Administration, Office of Civilian Defense.

"It is all very well to have the Russian military forces aid us by waging war upon Hitlerism," said Representative Hoffman, "but the fact that every blow they strike at Hitler is a benefit to us is no reason why we should either retain or call into Government service those who have the slightest leaning toward the Communist theory of government."

Congressman Hoffman declared that "the Dies Committee pointed out long ago that more than a thousand Communists were on the Federal payroll," and that "the Administration has done nothing to remove them."

The Michigan Representative characterized Cowley's employment in an \$8,000-a-year Federal job as "just another step in the program to entrench in Federal positions those who believe that our Constitution, including the Bill of Rights, has outlived its usefulness."

Representative Ford said "I should think that my colleagues in the House would begin to stop, look and listen with respect to the Communists and Socialists who are being appointed to high Government positions."

"Day after day," said Representative Ford, "these Communists and these Socialists are constantly being appointed. I cannot see how a real Democrat can accept them, and I know that the real Republican cannot accept these people. Our danger, as I have repeatedly stated, has been from within as well as from war from without."

"Let us not be lulled to sleep and lose this war from within while we are fighting a war from without."

Representative Martin Dies, of Texas, declared on the floor of the House, Thursday, in connection with Cowley's employment by the Federal Government, that "the files of our committee show 72 connections of this high-salaried Government employe with the Communist Party and its front organizations." He asserted that "for at least 10 years, Cowley was one of

## Ban Catholic Prayerbooks

LONDON. — (NC) — Catholics living in Polish territory incorporated in the Reich have been ordered to give up all prayerbooks, according to a report issued here by the Polish Institute of the Sword of the Spirit.

It is stated that the official explanation of this Nazi decree is that Polish prayerbooks contain two hymns which are said to be national tunes. The same authority states that the order restricting Mass and the administration of the Sacraments to Poles are being enforced with greater severity, and that throughout the "General Government" area all church bells have been confiscated and that the Cracow Chapter, which protested the order, has been arrested.

## JUST, CHARITABLE PEACE IMPOSSIBLE IF AXIS WINS

RENO, Nev. — (NC) — An Axis victory will make considerations of charity and justice at the peace tables impossible, the Most Rev. Thomas K. Gorman, Bishop of Reno, declared here over Station KOH.

The Bishop urged Nevada Catholics to maintain the Catholic tradition of bravery, coolness, and willingness to make sacrifices in times of crisis.

## 57 Cases of Medical Supplies Sent In Day

NEW YORK. — Fifty-seven cases of medical supplies were shipped by the Catholic Medical Mission Board here to missions in Africa and Jamaica, B.W.I., on the day when Germany and Italy declared war on the United States. This is one of the largest and most valuable consignments ever sent out in the mission in one day.

Supplies sent to the missions by the Catholic Medical Mission Board are packed and shipped to the nearest station free of charge, through the kindness of benefactors who pay for this service, the Board states.
