Council, the Ladies of Charity have assigned to this Committee as their first project, a part in the Civilian Defense Volunteer Program. Acting as liaison officers for the local committee, under the direction of the State Office of Civilian Defense, they will make a survey of the Catholic Women's organizations in Elmira. The information, which is to be compiled will include a record of the participation of these groups and the individual members in the purchase of Defense bonds and stamps.

Other committees, meeting during the week are the Room Registry Committee, who are cooperating on living arrangements for registrants at the local Aviation Ground School, the Sewing and Red Cross Committees, who are devoting their efforts to Red Cross work and the Committee of the Infant of Prague, a new project which will complete organization plans this week.

The program for each week is concluded on Friday evenings, when about two hundred Junior and High School students spend several joyous hours at the Catholic Youth Organization Dance in Columbus Centre. Supervised by the members of the Recreation Committee this weekly event has the full approval of local pastors and thoughtful Catholic parents. Mindful of the solicitude of Holy Mother Church for the welfare of her youth the Ladies of Charity give generously themselves in this worthwhile project and receive in a return, a gratifying response from Catholic students from every parish in Elmira.

World-Girdling Clipper Commander Son of '37 Lactare Medal Receiver

NEW YORK. — Capt. Robert Ford, commander of the world-girdling Pacific Clipper of the Pan American Airways, is the son of Dr. Jeremiah D. M. Ford, Professor of Romance Languages at Harvard University, who received Notre Dame University's Lactare Medal in 1937.

Captain Ford, a Catholic like his father, was forced to fly around the world to get home after having been overtaken by the war when the clipper was still over the Pacific.
