HOME GROWN GAMES

A visitor looked on with interest as a group of little children played a game with marbles on the back of an old map probably thirty inches square. It was a map of a state, mounted on heavy cardboard. Having hung on the wall until old and faded the center bulged out slightly, and there were some other defects through the surface was not broken. Each child had six or eight common marbles, "glassies," they called them, and by laying the map face down on the floor and tilting the corners dexterously they could make the flock of sheep—the marbles—rush round the edge, or huddle together in the middle at will. Sometimes the whole flock went into a stampede owing to some child setting an elbow on the rim, and sometimes they tilted the broad surface in such erratic ways that the sheep dashed back and forth and round and round like mad. It was great fun, even to the visitor, watching the skill with which the older children could keep the flock together and moving.

They have little tricycles and wagons to play with in town but when they can go to the country and play with that old wreck of a car and push or pull it around they shriek with joy.

The first boat to reach the opening won the race, of course.

"Well, I've learned something. I think I won't try to discourage my grandchildren any more when they work at their store-box doll-house, though they do litter the side yard dreadfully," said the visitor, rising. "The thing looked so crude and ugly that I tried to persuade them to throw it away, promising to get them a real doll-house. But it is still standing there. They didn't want to give it up but said that they would, of course, if I insisted. But they may go back to the cartons and boards and the rest of their treasures since I see how ingenious this constructive play is making your children. Thank goodness, it is never too late to learn."

WASHINGTON.—(NC)—A bibliography of works on economics by Catholic writers, compiled in commemoration of the fiftieth anniversary of Pope Leo XIII's great social Encyclical Rerum Novarum, on the condition of labor, will be published this month by the Catholic University of America Press.

Dedicated to the Rt. Rev. Mgr. John A. Ryan, Director of the Social Action Department of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, and comprising some 700 titles, including books and pamphlets, the volume has been prepared by Dr. Paul J. FitzPatrick, professor of economics at the Catholic University, and the Rev. CHAS. F. DICKSON, C.P.S., professor of economics at St. Joseph's College, Collegeville, Ind.
