## Cornerstone Rite Spurs Workers for New St. Mary's

"Onward — for St. Mary's" — with this as their slogan, leaders and workers in the campaign for the new St. Mary's Hospital will redouble their efforts over the week-end to attain the goal of \$275,000 and pass it.

Actively directing the campaign is His Excellency, Bishop Kearney, who officially placed the cornerstone Sunday afternoon in the new hospital. It is to complete the 375-bed modernly equipped hospital that the campaign is being conducted. When completed the hospital will be in a position to meet needs arising in the present war emergency.

The campaign was launched with a turn-out last Thursday evening in Columbus Civic Centre auditorium which in numbers and enthusiasm was declared by old campaigners to have surpassed the opening of any previous campaigns. Inspiration in their quest was brought to the workers by Lt. Gen. Charles J. Nelligan, Chaplain-in-Chief of the Canadian Armed Forces who is Bishop of Pembroke.

Explains Hospital Need Presented by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney, the Canadian Bishop who is head of all the chaplains in the Canadian army gave a graphic account of conditions in England following the air raids.

"One of the greatest factors in keeping up the morale," Bishop Nelligan said, "was the care and consideration given to human suffering especially for the victims of the bombings."

Explaining that the British people were not prepared with hospitals to meet the number of casualties, he said that in a short time they were prepared. He emphasized the need for hospital beds when aerial bombers wreak their havoc.

A tribute to the nursing sisterhoods was paid by the Bishop-Chaplain who declared that suffering humanity has always turned to them confident of their care and devotion. Their devotion, self-sacrifice, personal service, constant vigilance and mercy are written into imperishable records in the present war as in other wars, he said.

Comments Organization That men of different nationalities, different faiths and political beliefs had gathered here to help build a Sisters' hospital in times like these, was to him, edifying, the Bishop of Pembroke stated.

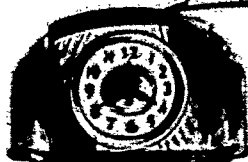
