Baroness de Hueck Coming To Lecture Sunday, Feb. 1

The Baroness Catherine de Hueck, famous foundress of Friendship House in Harlem, is scheduled to lecture this Sunday evening, Feb. 1, at 8:30 P. M., in Blessed Sacrament Hall, Oxford St. Admission price will be 35 cents, tax included. The public is invited to attend.

Catherine de Hueck is a member of the former Russian nobility. During the Russian Revolution, her father, brother and 20 relatives were killed by the Communists. The Baroness and the remaining members of her family were imprisoned on their own estate in Finland and were sentenced to death by hunger. They escaped to a foreign refuge.

The Baroness then acted as nurse and interpreter to the British forces during the remainder of the war. In charge of a large Red Cross Unit, she was decorated for bravery under fire.

Coming after the war to America, she established Friendship Houses, first in Toronto, then in Ottawa, both at the invitation of the local Bishops, and finally in New York for its 400,000 Negroes in congested Harlem. She hopes to spend the rest of her life for Harlem's Negroes, living in voluntary poverty. By her deeds she is writing an epic of Christian heroism. She will lecture on "A Rendezvous with Christ," the Story of Friendship House.

The Baroness on Wednesday Feb. 11, will be the guest speaker at the annual banquet of the Sodality of Our Lady of St. Patrick's Church, Elmira.

In a letter thanking the members of our Council for a recent contribution to the Maintenance Fund of the National Catholic School of Social Service, Rev. Lucian Lauerman, Director of the School, commends our interest in Catholic training for social work. He continues: "During this year and the years to follow, we are going to be pressed as never before for persons educated to represent the Catholic teaching in the field of social service. More and more it is going to become necessary to add to the ranks of those who feel that there must be fraternal activity on a private religious basis as a counterpart to the non-religious activities carried on under government auspices. There are many who feel that in the preservation of private charitable activity not only are the spiritual standards of individuals and groups at stake but even the very foundations of a true democracy." He adds: "We are most happy this year to have two students from Rochester, one of whom will graduate in a few weeks. Both students have done very well and we hope that we may continue to have representatives from the Diocese in our School."

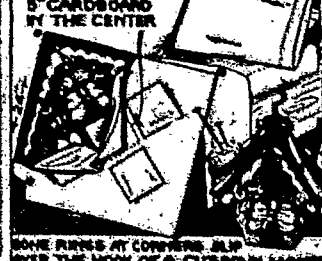
