Nun's Final Rites Set Today

Sister M. Florence Dwyer.

Funeral services for Sister M. Florence Dwyer, a member of the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph since 1891, were to be held this morning (Thursday, Jan. 29) at the Nazareth Chapel, Pittsford.

Sister Florence died Tuesday, Jan. 27, 1942 at the Motherhouse in Pittsford after a long illness.

Born in St. Bridget's parish in Hand Street, she attended St. Bridget's school. After being received into the Sisters of St. Joseph, she began her teaching career at St. Patrick's parish, Seneca Falls where her brother, the late Rev. Michael A. Dwyer was pastor.

Sister taught there until the death of her brother 15 years ago. Coming to Rochester she taught at St. Bridget's until forced to retire because of illness.

Surviving Sister Florence are her two sisters, Sister M. Gertrude of Lockport and Miss Katherine Dwyer of Rochester; and a brother, Eugene J. Dwyer, prominent Rochester attorney and Catholic layman, of Rochester.

Fr. D'Arcy Sends Thanks For Map

About to return to his post, following his speaking tour of the United States, the Rev. Martin C. D'Arcy, S.J., this week, acknowledged with his thanks a map of early Jesuit missionary endeavor in this area presented to him when he spoke at Aquinas Institute.

The famed Jesuit scholar was given the map by its author, Alexander M. Stewart at the time of the former's Christian Culture lecture here. The map is the same that appeared in the 1934 CATHOLIC COURIER Diocesan Review and Calendar.

Father D'Arcy in a letter to Mr. Stewart explained his delay in acknowledging the map and stated: "I do indeed thank you and congratulate you on a fine piece of work and one which is bound to be so instructive to a member of the Society of Jesus. The map, studied together with your pamphlet, gives a wonderful picture of great days and great men."

Mr. Stewart has also been recipient of a citation from the Rochester Museum for an exhibit of early Catholic history at the recent New York State Historical Society meeting in Geneva.
