### Catholic Labor College

Social Insurance As Provided By Legislation

Social insurance in the various forms provided by legislation, particularly by the Social Security Act and Workmen's Compensation Laws, was discussed by Dr. Aaron S. Abell, Ph. D., in his lecture on current social legislation, delivered at the Rochester Catholic Labor College session on Friday evening, Jan. 23, at St. Joseph's House of Hospitality. Dr. Abell lamented the fact that the State has made no adequate provision for health and hospital insurance. The question of whether the State or private concerns should underwrite health and hospital insurance was debated in the discussion following Dr. Abell's lecture. It was argued that an extension by law of such a plan as the Rochester Hospital Service Corporation would be preferable to an insurance law based on the plan of social security benefits. The following principle was cited from Pope Pius XI's encyclical On the Reconstruction of the Social Order:

"It is indeed true, as history clearly proves, that owing to the change in social conditions, much that was formerly done by small bodies can nowadays be accomplished only by large corporations. None the less, just as it is wrong to withdraw from the individual and commit to the community at large what private enterprise and industry can accomplish, so too it is an injustice, a grave evil and a disturbance of right order for a larger and higher organization to arrogate to itself functions which can be performed efficiently by smaller bodies. This is a fundamental principle of social philosophy, unshaken and unchangeable, and it retains its full truth today. Of its very nature the true aim of all social activity should be to help individual members of the social body, but never to destroy or absorb them."

It was recommended also that Workmen's Compensation Laws be amended to extend benefits to all government and interstate workers, to include provision for a weekly payment of two-thirds the worker's normal wage, adequate medical attention for as long as is necessary, and definite provision for all occupational diseases. Man's right to the goods of earth was discussed by the Rev. George E. Vogt, director of the Labor College, in his latest lecture on Ownership. Father Vogt declared that "man needs the goods of this earth in order to fulfill his obligations as man; because man has a moral duty of developing his character here on earth and a consequent right to all that he needs for developing his character." Moreover, this duty and correlative right belong to all men without exception; it means every man insofar as he is a man.

"Such is the full meaning of our fundamental principle in regard to the goods of the earth. It is indeed all-important, but by itself it does not yet settle any problems of the social question. On the contrary, it serves rather to open a whole array of further questions." A continuation of this idea will be considered at the next meeting of the Labor College to be held Friday, Jan. 31, 8 P. M.

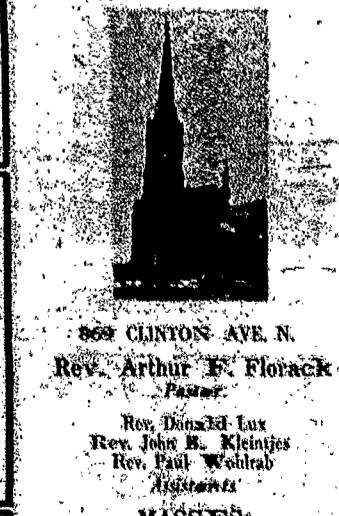
