mond F. Leinen reported \$130,441.50, or 104 per cent, and paid tribute to the large givers in the campaign.

Eclipsing the men's division, by a narrow margin, the women's division, led by Mrs. Charles J. Paley and Mrs. Rudolph C. Siebert, reported a total of \$69,814.68, or 149 per cent, of the quota.

With Thomas A. Sharp and William T. Nolan as leaders, the men's division reported \$96,814.69, or 116 per cent of their quota.

St. Mary's medical staff, directed by Dr. Leo F. Simpson, turned in \$28,544, or 127 per cent, while the nurses and alumnae, headed by Helen Ward and Molly Scanlon, had \$11,537.00, for 115 per cent. The Suburban Division report

made by Augustine J. Cunningham totaled \$4,782.16.

Top Team and Division
High team, led by Mrs. Robert Hartman, who is president of the Catholic Women's Club, reported \$7,188 for the surprisingly high percentage of 327. The division of which this leading team was a unit turned in \$21,307.70, or 193 per cent of quota. It was reported by Mrs. Francis P. Beattie, division chairman.

Ray Healy and Rolla Patton headed the high men's division reporting \$16,154.11, or 138 per cent. The team leading headed by Victor Noel and Henry Kimmel, had a report of \$3,829.25, or 207 per cent.

Praise was showered upon all the campaigners with particular laudation given to Bishop Kearney and Louis A. Langie as chairmen. The campaign manager, A. E. Metzdorf, shared in the praise for the excellent organization work done.

A "real contribution" to the campaign was made, Bishop Kearney stated, by the Rev. Hugh Chamberlain Burr, executive secretary of the Federation of Churches, who notified churches in the federation of the drive and urged the ministers to speak of it from their pulpits.

It was brought out that Vice-Chairman Louis A. Langie and Mrs. Langie, active in the campaign, were son-in-law and daughter, respectively, of the late J. Adam Kress, who headed the campaign for the Nurses' Home in 1922.

The new hospital now under construction will cost in the neighborhood of \$1,300,000 and will be of the latest design in equipment and facilities. The present structure will be used for administration, consultation, out-patient and meeting room purposes, according to present plans.

Mr. Damarell said, "A huge armorial banner with the heraldic device was affixed to the walls of the Cathedral and the University of Salamanca in Spain," he added. "The base of the design read: 'To Christ the King and Victor.' The center of the shield was quite simple, and without a field, inscribed with the huge dominating letter 'V.' This was the original 'V' for Victory crusading slogan in the known Catholic history."
