## Catholic Labor College

### Need To Provide For Old Age Assistance

"Few" workers receive sufficient income to make any voluntary provision for old age or have the opportunity to avail themselves of an adequate industrial pension plan; consequently, there are many dependent old persons," stated Dr. Aaron S. Abell, Ph.D., explaining the necessity for provision for old age assistance.

Dr. Abell's talk was the latest in his series of lectures on social security legislation at the Friday evening sessions of the Rochester Catholic Labor College, conducted at St. Joseph's House of Hospitality.

In his lecture on Friday, Jan. 30, Dr. Abell discussed the National Social Security Act of 1935, later amended in 1939, which provides for: (1) Old Age Insurance, (2) Old Age Assistance, (3) Aid to widows and their dependent children, (4) Unemployment Insurance.

"This assistance (for old age)," he said, "generally takes the form of federal grants-in-aid to States which already give old age pensions. It is necessary because life expectancy has become greater, while utility in industry has become shorter term."

The necessity of some state plan to provide for needy old persons has long been recognized and met in Europe; but it is a relatively new idea in our state and federal governments. Hitherto the only pension plans we've known have been industrial pension plans instituted by companies, particularly those that required skilled workers, in order to maintain their staffs. There have also been some pension plans instituted by labor unions. The unions generally opposed the industrial pension plans; because, as a matter of policy, they are opposed to any plan that ties the worker to his employer rather than to the union.

The relative merits of the old age assistance plan as provided for in the Social Security Act, the industrial pension plans, union pension plans, and private insurance plans were discussed after Dr. Abell's talk. A tendency to "paternalism" on the part of the state was cited as an objection to the Social Security plan. The union plans were opposed by some persons on the grounds that whenever unions sold insurance, the insurance became the "be-all and the end-all" of the union.

"All men have a moral right to the goods of earth necessary for a decent living," said the Rev. George E. Vogt, director of the Labor College, continuing his series of talks on Ownership.

"A denial of this principle (and it is denied most flatly by birth controllers) would be equivalent to a denial of all moral law and human right, and leads logically to an avowal of the immoral principle that might is right."

Father Vogt explained that the moral right to the goods of this earth necessarily included the right to individual use of those goods necessary for decent living, but does not necessarily include the right to individual ownership of those goods. This distinction is very clear in the case of religious communities. He added, however, that as a protection against the State, against invasion of rights, against insecurity, and against injustice, the institution of private ownership is a relative necessity in human society. The general arguments advanced in Christian times for the institution of private property will be the theme of Father Vogt's next talk.

There will be two more regular Friday evening sessions of the Labor College, with a special closing session on Tuesday, Feb. 17, at 8 P. M., when the Rt. Rev. Mgr. Luigi G. Ligutti, co-author of *Rural Roads to Security* and national director of the Catholic Rural Life Conference will speak. The College will then adjourn for the Lenten Season.
