SENECA FALLS—Reviving the spirit of the "Everybody Welcome—Everything Free" slogan of the Knights of Columbus in World War I, Seneca Falls Council, Knights of Columbus is opening its rooms to all service men at all times.

This announcement was made at a special meeting of the Council's Defense Committee appointed by Grand Knight Thomas B. Masten and headed by Edward M. Leonard.

The K. of C. rooms in the Daniels Building at Fall and State Street will be set to welcome Seneca Falls men on furlough and other service men visiting the locality or passing through the village, it was stated.

The welcome applies to men in all branches of the United States

service, Army, Navy, Marine and Air Corps. Indoor sports available for the amusement of the service men will include dart-ball, pool, table tennis, checkers and cards. Reading rooms will be open and stationery provided.

Facilities of the rooms have also been offered to the Seneca Falls Defense Committee and to the Red Cross for conducting first aid classes, if required.

All service men in the locality are invited to a Council social meeting, Monday night, Paul S. Sisson, Seneca County American Legion and a member of the local Defense Committee, will be the guest speaker.
