### Catholic Labor College

#### Unemployment Provision in Social Security Act

Discussion of current social legislation considering especially the unemployment insurance provision of the Social Security Act was continued by Dr. Aaron A. Abell at the last regular Friday evening session of Rochester Catholic Labor College.

Doctor Abell stated that under modern industrial conditions, unemployment is the worker's chief hazard. The aim of the unemployment provision in the Social Security Act is, he said, to eliminate this hazard. The primary purpose of the law should be, then, to stimulate employers to provide steady employment for their workers.

The socially progressive state legislatures of Wisconsin, which first enacted an unemployment insurance law, kept this purpose in mind, the lecturer continued, when they provided that the employer should bear the entire cost of unemployment insurance.

Unemployment insurance may be voluntary or compulsory. If voluntary, it should be underwritten by the labor unions; if compulsory, by the State. The voluntary method is presently inadequate in this country because relatively few workers are organized. This method, he said, originated in the city of Ghent, Belgium.

The Ghent plan provided for municipal or state subsidies to trade unions which gave unemployment compensation to their members. This plan is practical for countries, such as Belgium, where the vast majority of the workers are organized; but is impractical for countries, such as ours, where the vast majority of workers are unorganized. Under our Social Security Act the federal government subsidizes those states which provide for unemployment compensation.

**Discussion Ownership**

The argument for private ownership was considered in a discussion on "Ownership" by the Rev. George C. Vogt, director of the Labor College. Necessity of private ownership of goods arises from the fact, he pointed out, that (1) man has need of these goods necessary for a decent living; (2) man has a moral right to these goods; (3) man needs some assurance that his right to these goods is secure. Private ownership is then, a necessary social institution, because it is a safeguard of man's moral right to the goods of earth.

Father Vogt announced that there will be one more regular Friday evening session before the special closing session on Tuesday evening, Feb. 17, at St. Joseph's House of Hospitality, 402 South Ave. On that date the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Luigi G. Ligutti, founder of the Granger Homestead, Cooperative Community in Iowa, will speak. There will be no admission charge. (Other story elsewhere in this issue.)

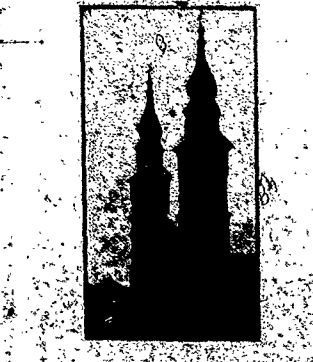
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
