SUNDAY MASS CHANGES

Commencing Sunday, Feb. 15, the first Sunday of War Saving Time, the Sunday schedule of Masses in St. Margaret Mary's Church will be: 7:00, 8:00, 9:00, 10:00, 11:00, 12:00 in the Church and 10:00 in the hall. There will be no Mass in the hall at 11:00. It is announced in the St. Margaret Mary Weekly of Feb. 8.

The Weekly states: "In an attempt to meet the increase of parishioners during the past year we have added first a 10:00 o'clock Mass in the Hall and three weeks ago we added a seventh Mass at 11:00 in the Hall."

"Thursday of this week we received from Bishop James E. Kearney, D.D., notice that all par-

ishes in the diocese are authorized to have a noon day Mass to take care of the men who are working nights in the interest of national defense." The Weekly then lists the schedule of Sunday Masses as above.

Having the largest class being conducted in Monroe County, the parish has each Thursday evening a class on First Aid under the supervision of the American Red Cross in St. Margaret Mary's Hall.

The Annual Fathers and Sons' Banquet will be held on Tuesday evening, Feb. 17, at the Rochester Turnverein on Clinton Ave. North. Fred Messmer is chairman. Reservation chairmen are James Mead and Walter Foery.

An excellent program has been arranged and the whole affair will conclude not later than 9:30, states the Weekly.

Press Role Important In Present World Crisis, Says Educator

DES MOINES.—(NC)—With the world confronted today by the need of establishing an intellectual and moral basis on which the lives of all its citizens are to be based in order to avoid the dreadful confusion and terrific upheavals which have attacked civilization for the last quarter-century, the press has a necessary, natural and logical role of great importance to play.

This was the message sounded by Dean J. L. O'Sullivan, of the Marquette University College of Journalism, Milwaukee, as he gave his president's address at the opening session of the national convention of the American Association of Schools and Departments of Journalism.

"The press must assume this role," Dean O'Sullivan declared. "Even if it chooses not to do so, or because it is blind and incapable of doing it, does not consciously and intentionally set about to play a part in deciding principles, it nevertheless has to play a part. Otherwise, by its own blindness and lack of effort it will nullify the intelligence of the multitude who rely upon it into a sense of security as false and uncertain as that which has pervaded the minds of the people for the last 25 years."

Dean O'Sullivan then emphasized that if the press, in its essential function of revealing the nature and significance of the events of the day, seeks to live up to this enormous obligation, then it must see the news against the true background of history and of right and wrong principles.

"The press must be manned by men who are able to make such observations and interpretations," he continued. "The only place such men can be trained is in universities by university scholars, or by men who have had the same opportunity and the same leisure as university scholars possess."

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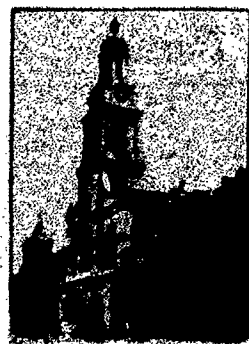
