

"Those who are engaged in works of mational defense and must work after midnight, may receive Holy Communion without observing the fast required by Canon Law."

"These workers must abstain from solid food for at least four hours before receiving Holy Com-munion, and from liquids for at least ONE Hour."

With Lent approaching, His Excellency urges upon all the faithful "the importance of prayer and sacrifice in the winning of victory and peace."
