Diocese Chaplains To Receive 12,000 Articles Sent By School Children

Bishop's Appeal Brings Avalanche of Religious Articles For Soldiers

"You have answered it with more than 3,000 rosaries, 6,000 medals, 2,500 prayer-books, 700 crucifixes and hundreds of pieces of literature and miscellaneous items."

This is reported by His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester, in expressing appreciation for the generous response to his appeal for religious articles to be sent to Chaplains from this diocese for men in the armed forces.

The Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes, Wednesday of last week, marked the close of a drive sponsored by the Bishop in the schools of the diocese for the rosaries and religious articles for the men in the service.

From Owego to Summerville, from Auburn to Perkinsville, package after package, box upon box, poured into the Catholic Education Office. Friends in towns of the diocese not having Catholic schools sent in their contributions to the Center in response to the announcement in the Jan. 29, 1942 CATHOLIC COURIER.

Sodalists under the direction of Miss Florence Dietrich, President of the Sodality Union, undertook the task of unpacking, sorting and counting the results of the "Treasure Hunt" launched by Bishop Kearney. Contents revealed that it was more than a treasure hunt.

Children in some schools used money usually expended on Valentines for the purchase of new rosaries, medals on chains and prayer-books. In one school, pupils mounted 650 medals and sent in athletic chains "for the Chaplains" and 200 official prayerbooks for the "U. S. A. Men in Service."

Among hundreds of new rosaries were found unusual ones artistically combining beads of two colors which showed that efforts had been made to make use of every contribution. One Sister alone re-

My dear People:

With the impressive and significant ceremony of Ash Wednesday, we shall enter the Holy Season of Lent. The season has seldom come upon us at a time when those practices which express the spirit of Lent were so necessary as today. In a very serious national crisis such as we now face, the combined power of prayer and penance, devotions and mortifications, are our most potent contributions to the victory and peace for which we pray daily.

We have an obligation to solicit divine guidance for our leaders. We have pledged the assistance of our prayers to those who fight our battles. We seek God's protection for our homes, our institutions, and all these liberties which constitute our American way of life. It is not asking too much that we sacrifice our comfort in order to make this Lenten Season especially powerful for our own salvation and for the needs of our country. This is no ordinary Lenten Season and no customary interpretation of its meaning or ordinary way of life can hope to effect the results we pray for.

The season must be most extraordinary in the tremendous volume of prayer which will ascend to the throne of God for the intention common to all of us, victory and peace.

Let me suggest then, that you assist at Mass every day during Lent and that you add to the time spent at Mass at least a quarter of an hour of prayer in church in the presence of Jesus Christ. If this will require a sacrifice on your part, if it will put you to great inconvenience, the value of the exercise will be so much greater.

I would have you take that as the theme of my Lenten message *Daily Mass for the Holy Season*. Put this exercise first of all, and any additional prayers, mortifications, and sacrifices will take on increased power and efficacy in the sight of God. As your Bishop and supreme pastor, I beg of all of you the daily Lenten Mass, and then whatever further individual or parish devotions you can arrange.

May our merciful Father in heaven see fit to accept the Lenten prayers of our people and restore peace to this upset world and return our loved ones to our broken homes.

Frs. Maloney, Murphy Expect Crusade Orders Join Up As Chaplains To Reach New High

Called to serve their country as chaplains in the U. S. Army, this week, were two more priests of the Diocese of Rochester.

They are: The Rev. John S. Maloney, assistant pastor, Blessed Sacrament Church.

The Rev. J. Emmett Murphy, assistant pastor, St. Francis de Sales Church, Geneva.

Father Maloney with the rank of First Lieutenant has been assigned to Fort Benjamin Harrison, Indianapolis, Ind. and Father Murphy with the same ranking goes to Camp Claiborne, North Carolina.

A native of Elmira, Father Maloney attended Elmira Southside High School and St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminary. Ordained June 25, 1936 he has served at Blessed Sacrament Church where the parishioners, last week, presented him with a check for \$1,000.

Father Murphy's home is in Rochester. Following study at the St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminary and Gregorian University in Rome he was ordained Dec. 8, 1938. He has served as Assistant Pastor, St. Francis of Assisi, Auburn and has been at St. Francis de Sales, Geneva since Jan. 25, 1941.

Undeterred by weather conditions which made solicitation a real problem this year, the Crusaders carried on and the response from the grown-ups also had a major share in the Crusade's success.

With observance of Catholic Press Month continuing throughout February, dioceses are urged to continue to talk up their own diocesan newspaper and to urge their friends and neighbors to subscribe.

Appreciation for the effort expended in the Crusade will be duly extended in the March 5 issue when the results are made known.

CONVICTION FOR PAMPHLET DISTRIBUTION STANDS

WASHINGTON—A fine imposed on a member of Jehovah's Witnesses under a New York State law prohibiting the distribution of pamphlets on Monday was sustained when Benjamin Morante failed to win a United States Supreme Court review of his conviction by the Westchester, N. Y. County court. Morante had been fined \$10 for a violation in Mount Kisco, N. Y. but payment had been suspended.
