

# Inter-Faith Group **Cites Common Beliefs**

Celebration of National Brotherhood Week in Rochester was marked by an announcement of certain basic convictions in which Cath-olics, Protestants and Jews share belief.

This statement was issued by the Rt. Rev. Magr. William M. Hart, V. G., chairman, and the Rev. Hugh Chamberlain Birr. DD., secretary of the Inter-Faith Goodwill Committee.

Similar statements were made throughout the country symbolis-ing the unity which has been de-veloped by the three creeds.

These common convictions were described as: I-Belief in one God, creator and

sustainer of the Universe. 2—Rejection of all attempts to explain man in "merely material terms."

3. Belief that Ged's "all-boly will" is the ultimate sanction of firman morality, and rejection of all deterministic interpretations of

MINT. 4-Belief that education or secial theories which state man's delies, standards and happiness without reference to god are doomed so

5-Belief that "God's fatherly providence" extends equally to every human being and rejection of theories of race which affirm the essential superiority of racial strain over another.
