URGES CRIME PREVENTION

AUBURN — Home guidance and school training of youth can help to prevent crime, members of the Sacred Heart League of Holy Family Church were told at the Valentine dinner party, Feb. 11 in Osborne Hotel.

A large and enthusiastic audience greeted the speaker of the evening, Lieut. Martin Dillon of the New York State Police. His topic was "Crime Prevention."

Co-chairmen for the big party were Miss Margaret Brady and Miss Margaret Maywalt. Zeal and progress were manifested in committees' reports. It was reported that sufficient money has been donated to send a large number of Sacred Heart badges to soldiers and sailors now in the armed forces.

Mrs. Lucy Murphy, R.N., reported that the home nursing course is proving popular. Twenty-two young women are in her class at Red Cross headquarters. Miss Juliette Kavanaugh announced that the popular hostess parties are in full swing.

The Sacred Heart League has been asked to provide an outstanding entertainment feature at the Holy Family parish party to be held on March 17, St. Patrick's Day with Mrs. Helen Hester and Mrs. Ann Butler, co-chairmen.

In urging cooperation with the authorities in the prevention of crime, Lieut. Dillon told of the large number of boys from 18 to 24 now in state prisons and of reform schools crowded with boys only 14, 15 and 16 years of age.

He strongly urged home guidance for the young people so that their paths may be directed away from those leading to crime. He emphasized the need for school training and asked that youth be encouraged to have proper companionship and be taught to do the

right thing always. He urged that they be taught to have respect for their elders.

He dwelt upon the fact of "how little our people, especially the younger generation, know of the strictness of the laws of New York State—what it means to offend even once in vehicle laws, theft, etc." and mentioned the prison sentences meted out to second, third and fourth offenders.

"What a shame and disgrace it is," the Lieutenant said, "to have to listen to the case histories of the young people, when, once having offended the law, they stand up and defy their superiors, even their mothers and fathers who were there to take their parts. Too lax a condition prevails in the home when the law advises parents to know where their young people are at all the time and of the company they are keeping."

Father Harding, moderator of the group, followed Lieut. Dillon's address. The moderator stressed the importance of mothers particularly giving the right training in the home. He urged that the younger members of the household co-operate with their superiors and the law to cut down this large increase of younger people getting into trouble which necessitates more reform schools and prisons.

Mrs. Mary Dillon, president, spoke briefly, advising that "our group will see that a program is carried out among mothers, after special conferences, etc. and will do all in our power to influence the younger members of the household, to know more about the severity of the laws of New York State; and to do everything that will influence the younger people in the community to be active only in constructive work for the country. Defense work, etc."

Guest soloist during the banquet program was Eleanor Boywid, who sang with fine feeling "White Cliffs of Dover" and "Maria Elena."
