The Lenten devotions are held every Wednesday and Friday evening at 7:45. Wednesday night services include the recitation of the Rosary, Sermon and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. Stations of the Cross are said on Friday night followed by Benediction.

During the Lenten season, the daily Masses will be said at 8:45, 7:30 and 8:15 o'clock, thus giving more people the opportunity of attending Mass. Holy Communion is also given before the 6:45 Mass.

Several hundred members of the Holy Name Society attended that organization's annual Communion breakfast of last Sunday. With a solemn procession Sunday evening at 7:45, Rev. Andrew Ansbro, C.M. of New York, and Rev. Clement Buckley, C.M. of Boston, opened a one-week Mission for the women of the parish. Mission Masses are offered daily at 8:00 and 8:00 o'clock with a short instruction after each Mass and services are held in the evening at 7:45. Special blessings will be given at the close of the Mission on Sunday afternoon. The same evening the Men's Mission will begin for all the men and young men of the parish. Mission Masses will be at 8:00 and 7:00 o'clock with a short instruction after each Mass and services will be held in the evening.

The Children's Mission began Tuesday afternoon at 3:30 P. M., continuing through to Friday morning when the children attended Mass and received Holy Communion in the closing exercises.

During the women's Mission, the Passionist Fathers spoke of the spiritual advantages and social privileges gained by membership in the Rosary Guild. Small cards were distributed inviting every woman

present to attend the next meeting of the Guild. It is hoped that this will do much to increase membership in this society. The meeting will be held on Tuesday evening, Mar. 2, instead of Monday, giving way to the Red Cross First Aid Unit now in the process of organization. Mrs. Eileen Leary Gibson will review one of the popular books of the day. Plans for the annual card party to be held the first week after Easter will also be discussed. It is hoped that as many of the women as possible will make a special effort to attend this meeting.

The new Red Cross Unit now has 137 men and women registered to receive instruction in first aid. Feb. 23 was the last day on which registrations for this group were open. Carl Schneider, instructor, is being assisted by Mrs. Jean Tracy and Francis J. Swift.

The Girl Scouts of Troops 143, 144 and 145 enjoyed a hay ride on last Friday evening. After the ride, they returned to the school hall for refreshments served by their leaders.
