BISHOP O'HARA SPEAKS

Before more than four thousand knights of Columbus at the Memorial Mass in St. Parrick's Cathedral in New York City last Munday, Bishop O'llara delivered a sermon in which he treated of the war preparations of the United States, and their importance in securing victory. The Bishop spoke of the material part of that preparation, the allout effects of labor and industry to turn out planes and tanks and guns and slaps: offorts so determined and production on a scale that is almost beyond the power of imagination to picture.
