ST. BONAVENTURE—A program of sports activity and physical education was made compulsory today upon the St. Bonaventure College student body for the remainder of the present semester by the Very Rev. Thomas Plasmann, O.F.M., president as a war-time measure.

In compliance with the order, Athletic Director Carroll Mike Reilly, and Physical Education Director Ed Jontos, aided by a committee of student senators have planned a program of a dozen or more varied sports activities. At the same time it was announced by Mr. Jontos that effective immediately, physical education classes will be extended to a minimum of three each week for each student.

Sports activities planned under the "emergency" program are: volleyball, baseball, billiards, table tennis, and track, boxing, wrestling, swimming, tennis and hiking. It is expected that a system of points whereby competition for a class award may be brought about will be devised. In addition, a program of Red Cross sponsored life saving and first aid classes will be offered.

In a statement to the collegians, the Very Rev. Father Thomas added: "The duty incumbent upon every man of taking proper care of his body, and of using every reasonable means toward preserving his health is now taking on an added obligation which arises from the present national emergency.

"Our national needs require sacrifices, and the foremost sacrifice is that every young man fit himself physically to whatever duty his country may assign him. I enlist the co-operation of the entire athletic staff with the request that it organize a program of sports and physical exercise which will afford opportunities to every student in the school, and I hereby make participation in one of these exercises compulsory for each and every collegian."
