### No Children' Ban On Tenants Forbidden **By** Australian Law

CANBERRA, Australia. — Under new legislative regulations pro-claimed by the Federal Minister for Labor, no landlord may refuse to let premises because a prospective tenant has a child. It will be an offense, the regulations state. to, inquire whether a prospective tenant has a child or whether it is intended that a child shall live in he dwelling."
