F. J. Sheed Lectures **Narch 15 at Aquinas** Dn 'New Apologetic'

Awakening people to the vitaliz-ng character of Christian thought or several years has been the work of Mr F J Sheed of London and New York. The seventh lecsure in the popular Christian Cul-lure Lecture Series at Aquinas In-stitute will be given by Mr Sheed bn Sunday evening, Mar. 15, at 3:30 P. M.

Determined to show thinking people that the great heritage of Iniatian truth contains all the elements needed to satisfy human minds, Mr. Sheed had, as a young lawyer founded in London, the famous publishing house of Sheed and Ward. The Ward in the firm is his wife, Maisie Ward, grandiaughter of Wilfrid Ward, the biographer of Cardinal Newman.
The revival in Ca'tholic literature, art and philosophy has been due

Interecival in Cartolic literature, but and philosophy has been due in great measure to the efforts of Sheed and Ward. In his lecture here, entitled "The New Apologetic." Dr Sheed will incorporate much of the material which has attirred the Catholics of England to an interne effort to Christiania. to an intense effort to Christianize their country

Quick to see the futility of de-Quick to see the futility of de-fending Christian principles against objectors, the Sheed technique has been to make Christian thought better known. A defensive attitude with regard to Christian doctrine under the skillful handling of Mr Sheed, has given place to a new tactic disarming the objector by acquainting him with the more profound, mind-satisfying aspects of Christianity. of Christianity.

At present, working closely with Cardinal Hinsley of Westminster, in the "sword of the spirit" campaign, Mr Sheed has agreed to ex-plain some of its work in the forum period following the lecture. The lecture at Aquinas is open to the public. Non-Catholics will find Mr. Sheed's material and man-ner especially attractive.


