### According To The Doctor

SORE THROATS

Many of the continuing sere throats are more than an aftermath of a winter cold. Recent in-restigation shows that a large number of heart diseases have had their leginnings in early life with infected tonsils.

Diseased tonsils may be en-larged. The small peckets in them may contain pus and there may be frequently attacks of sore throat, which, if severe, may result in ton-silitia. Nature makes a great effort to confine the pus to the tonsil and often succeeds in so doing. If the pus is confined it may do no pus is confined it may do no harm. But if it gets into the blood stream and floats about the circulatory system, it may lodge in the eye, producing eye inflammation. If it lodges in the muscles or about the joints, rheumatism may follow, or if upon the values of the heart, an inflammation of the lining of the heart may follow, resulting in chronic invalidism.

Some people have sore throat after the removal of their tonsils, Since the tonsils occupy but a small area of the pharynx, their removal may not prevent an in-flammation of the remaining mucuous membrane of the pharynx and occasionally an infection of the scar cissue formed in the old tonsil. Sore throat may follow

The threat then should not be subjected to continued spells of coughing and wheeling without ex-amination, attention and treat-ment. Something deeper and more serious may lie hidden beneath the symptom of sore threat.
