

With St. Andrew Seminarians

The anniversary of the coronation of Pope Pius XII was celebrated at St. Andrew's, Thursday, Mar. 12. Mass was celebrated in the St. John Fisher Chapel at the seminary and the seminarians offered their Mass and Holy Communion for the Holy Father's in-

tenitions. The pastor, Rev. Edward M. Lyons, said the Mass and presided the sermon on the Papacy. Benediction with prayers for the Novena in honor of St. Joseph closed the day's activities.

Father Thomas Brennan said Mass and preached at the St. William House for the seminarians living there in observance of the same anniversary.

St. Patrick's Day, according to custom, was celebrated with attendance at the Pontifical Mass at St. Patrick's. Seminarians of St.

Andrew's acted as minor servers of this Mass. St. Patrick was chosen by Bishop McQuaid as the patron of the diocesan preparatory seminary when opened in September, 1870. St. Patrick's Seminary later had its name changed to St. Andrew's Preparatory Seminary.

A Novena in honor of St. Joseph is being conducted at the seminary and will close with solemn services in the seminary chapel on Wednesday.

Quarterly examinations will be held this week.

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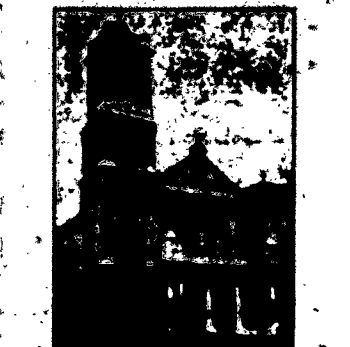

democracy; in 1942 we are told we are fighting for freedom.

"It is neither. Today we are fighting for morality. The boy who walks the streets of Singapore is in no more danger than the boy who walks the streets of New York."

"It is not us, some of whom are beginning to show a tinge of gray, in whom the dictator countries are interested. It is youth. Never has man stood at so dark a threshold. It is up to us to present a united front."

"You want to do something, to achieve fame, so that a 100 years from now you will be remembered? You can do this through a masterpiece you have been given the masterpiece of a boy."

Mr. McCarthy described the boy of today as the business man, the legislator or the priest of tomorrow. If you neglect him now, even though you achieve any goal you set, you can look in a mirror and call yourself a failure, he said.

"The father shows great concern over the physical food of his son receives at the table but when it comes to spiritual food it does not seem to matter so much. Whether the boy goes on to a successful career or turns to a life of crime and sin depends largely on his early home life.

"If you are going to become a

spiritual MacArthur there is your battle. What the future holds for your boy is your heritage. This is the role of destiny you can play in your country."

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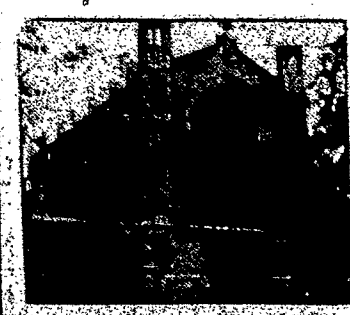

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Australia Studies Marriage Loans To Aid Young Couples

CANBERRA, Australia. — Much interest has been displayed in political and social circles by a proposal to help young couples by marriage loans embodied in a motion in the Victorian Legislative Assembly by the Deputy Leader of the Labor Party, H. M. Breeman, a Catholic and a sound exponent of Catholic social principles. Premier Daniell, of Victoria, has assured Mr. Breeman that the Government would inquire into the question and report back to the House.

Mr. Breeman's plan provides for loans up to \$500, with repayments over 20 years at 4 per cent. No repayments would be required in the first year after marriage. De-

ductions of loan repayments for children would be as follows: first, \$35; second, \$50; third, \$70; fourth, \$80; fifth, \$120; sixth, \$145, enabling the whole loan to be written off for couples with six children.

Mr. Breeman stated that marriages were delayed, and often prevented, by economic circumstances that it was almost impossible for young people in ordinary employment to set up and furnish a home without a heavy debt burden. In support of his argument, he pointed out that of Victoria's 22,298 marriages in 1940, a total of 10,143 brides were 25 or over, and 12,154 under 25, and more than two thirds of the bridegrooms were 25 or over.
