DISCUSSES WORLD PEACE

The Rev. James D. Cuffney, assistant pastor of St. Patrick's Church, in an address at a luncheon meeting of the Seneca Falls Kiwanis Club on March 12 said that "Out of this war there must come a just and equitable treaty of peace."

"Last summer," he said, "we were shocked to learn that our President and the Prime Minister of England met in mid-Atlantic and drew up eight points as a basis for peace after the war."

"At that time we were not a belligerent or a combatant nation. Notably by its absence was any mention of religion. No equitable or just peace can be concluded without morality — morality not only in the individual but also in the leaders of a nation and principally between nations themselves and there can be no morality in a world without religion."

"Therefore, religion should find its place as a basis for a just and equitable peace. We have no doubt whatever that we will win this war."

"When it is over a peace treaty must be ready. Will it be a repetition of the Treaty of Versailles? We fought the last war to make the world safe for democracy — it was merely a slogan, for when a treaty of peace was written, the 14 points of President Wilson and the principles on which peace was to be established according to Pope Benedict XV, were completely forgotten."

"In that peace conference, God and religion were entirely neglected."

History will put it down as the most unjust and inequitable peace treaty ever written. No matter what we may think of a people or their leaders we cannot justly crush them completely.

"Out of this war there must come a just peace unless we are prepared to fight another in the next generation. This war is simply a natural consequence of the treaty of Versailles."

"There is only one man in the world to whom we can look for a just and equitable peace. A man subject to no government, subject to no king accountable to no man but responsible to God alone, and that man is the Holy Father the Pope, having under his spiritual jurisdiction three and one half million people."

The Oblate Fathers have special services on Friday and Saturday evenings of the Mission. The Friday evening program consists of one decade of the rosary; renewal of Baptismal promises; Sefron and Solemn Benediction. The Saturday evening devotions are one decade of the rosary, exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, instruction, Act of Consecration, Solemn Papal Benediction and Solemn Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

The Men's Mission opens Sunday evening at 7:45. The Masses for this week will be at 5:30 and 7 o'clock with a short instruction after each Mass. Confessions will be heard each evening after devotions and every morning before the Masses.

The Children's Mission will close on Saturday morning at the 8 o'clock Mass. The blessing of the infants and children who are not of school age will be held on Sunday, March 22 at 3:30.

The Rosary and Scapular Society will hold their March meeting, Thursday, March 26, at 8 o'clock in Lyceum Hall.

There will be Stations of the Cross Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Because of the Mission this devotion of the Stations will not be held Friday evening. The place of the Lenten devotions this week and next week is being taken by the Mission.

The Novena of the Miraculous Medal will be held on Sunday evening at 7 o'clock instead of the usual hour of 7:30. The time has

been changed because the Mission service commences at 7:45.

Confessions are heard Saturday afternoon from 4 to 6 and in the evening from 7 to 9 and every Sunday before the Masses. The Novena of the Miraculous Medal is held on Monday evenings and the Stations of the Cross and Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament on Friday evenings. Tuesday and Wednesday evenings are reserved for instruction classes for the men in the army.

The bride and bridegroom will reside at 301 Castle Street.

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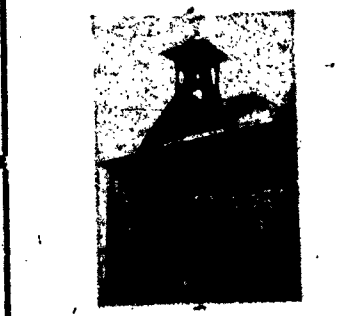
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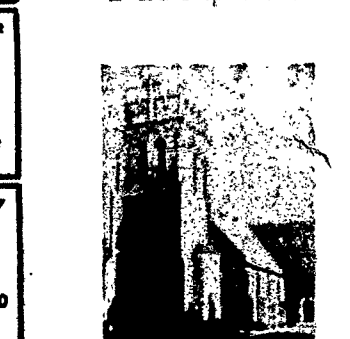
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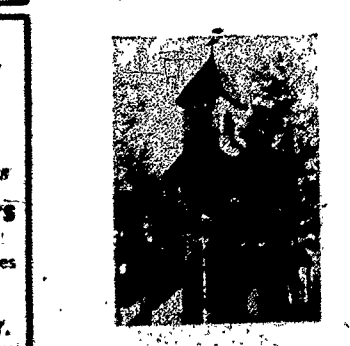
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
