Vatican Receives All **Nation's Envoys Says Archbishop Spellman**

NEW YORK, - The Holy See must remain neutral in the world conflict and, following its traditional policy accepts an ambassador from any country that chooses to send one to it, the Most Rev. Francis J. Spoliman, Archbishop of New York, declared here.

The Archbishop spoke at the Solemn Mass according to the By-zantine Rite offered in St. Patrick's Cathedral as a highlight of the fourth annual conference on Oriental Rites and Liturgies. Ho mentioned no country in the manual contents of the country in the coun ental Rites and Liturgies. Ho. mentioned no country in his sermon, but he said afterwards, in response to questions by newspapermen, that possible acceptance by the Vatican of a Japanese diplomatic mission would be entirely justified. It was recently reported in the press that Japan had requested diplomatic relations with the Holy Sec.

"Leaders of nations have tried to "Leaders of nations have tried to influence the Holy Father or one side of the other, but the Holy Father must be impartial." Archbishop Spellman said. The Holy See, he added, must receive the envoys who choose to make their contacts with it

said the Supreme Pontiff is interested in the welfare of Catholics
everywhere; that he regards them
as his spiritual children wherever
they may live, and that diplomatic

opportunity of keeping in touch
with and siding the Catholics of
