Regional Meet Plans Approved By State Central Verein Group

Plans to hold a Regional Conference in Rochester on Sunday, May 17, were approved by the State Executive Committee of the Catholic Central Verein of America and the National Catholic Women's Union meeting in Buffalo on Sunday, Mar. 22.

It is expected that delegates from Utica, Syracuse and Buffalo will attend this conference.

Arrangements will be made by local committees to combine the Regional Conference with the annual celebration by the Rochester Branches of the Papal Encyclicals on Labor.

Convention Outlined

The State Executive Committee also heard plans of the Buffalo Branch concerning the State Convention to be held over Labor Day weekend in that city. It was the opinion of the Committee that this year's convention should be an outstanding one in view of world conditions and in the nature of the work taken up by the convention.

"There never was a time," stated one of the speakers, "when the work of the Catholic Central Verein of America and the National Catholic Women's Union was more important. During these days there is danger of stressing too much, the material, and too little, the spiritual interests of man. A reasonable understanding of the relative importance of these interests must be constantly kept in mind."

The State Executive Committee met at the rectory of St. Louis Church and were the guests of the Rev. Henry B. Laudenbach, L.L.D. Father Laudenbach outlined the plans for the State Convention and assured the delegates that the Buffalo Branch would make every effort to have a successful convention.

"Certainly it can be nothing but a labor of love to devote a small portion of one's time to the making of scapulars for a dear one who is away doing military training or for a boy who has no mother to perform this labor for him," Mrs. Meiser states.

Holy Thursday Rite Set At Mt. Morris

Final arrangements are being completed this week for a procession proceeding the Blessed Sacrament on Holy Thursday morning following the 7:30 Mass at St. Patrick's Church, Mt. Morris.

Forty youngsters carrying candles and the altar boys will make up the group. James Brade and Francis Nasca will lead the procession of children who are members of the first four grades and kindergarten of St. Patrick's School.

Third Order Of St. Francis

Twenty new members joined the ever-growing ranks of Franciscans in this city at the February meeting of the Third Order. The March meeting was held, as usual, on the fourth Sunday of the month at St. Patrick's Church, Mar. 22, at 3:30 o'clock.

Profession of all novices who have completed a year in the order was conducted by the Rev. Bartholomew O'Brien, Spiritual Director.

Origin of Stations

Now in Lent it is interesting to recall that the Way of the Cross is a devotion of Franciscan origin. Tradition tells us that the Blessed Mother after the death of her divine Son, often visited the scenes of His passion. Later others followed her example, and it was on such a pilgrimage that the great St. Helena discovered the True Cross. In 1212, St. Francis sent friars to Palestine to guard the holy places, a responsibility which remains in Franciscan hands to this day. Still later the popes granted rich indulgences to those who followed the sorrowful way from Pilate's house to Golgotha. The points at which pilgrims stopped were called stations.

Some of the pilgrims went back home and set up "stations" in church yards, monastery gardens, or private grounds. Finally Franciscan friars thought of putting them inside the churches. The devotion was approved by the Pope, the number of stations set at fourteen, and a plenary indulgence granted to all who, with devout heart, walk from station to station and meditate upon the sufferings and death of Our Lord Jesus Christ.

All Can Participate

No special prayers need be said, although an Our Father, Hail Mary, and Gloria are commonly said at each station and at the completion of the journey. In public devotions, the priest makes the journey for the people.

Those who are sick, at sea, or in military service, or otherwise prevented from making the Way of the Cross in church may gain the same rich indulgences by saying fourteen Our Fathers, Hail Marys, and Glorias for the stations, five in honor of the Five Wounds, and one for the Pope, at the same time holding in their hands a crucifix blessed for the purpose by a Franciscan priest or by any other priest to whom the faculty has been given.

Such crucifixes can be obtained at the Franciscan Monastery in Washington, D. C., or from the St. Anthony Guild, Paterson, N. J., or the St. Anthony Monastery, Cincinnati, Ohio.
