We quote from a letter of our National Executive Secretary, Miss Margaret T. Lynch:

"During World War I, under the direction of the National Catholic War Council, there was a Committee on Women's Activities. The general purpose of the committee was to assist the Catholic women of the country to utilize their efforts and their energies in the most effective way to help win the war. It further served to coordinate the wartime efforts of the women's organizations and to record their contribution in the service of their country. The National Council of Catholic Women is an outgrowth of this committee. It was established by the Hierarchy of the United States to unite the endeavors of Catholic women in matters concerning the welfare of Church and Nation.

"During World War I, under various agencies, Catholic women made a very worthwhile contribution.

"Now, after 30 years of intensive experience in organization and programming, the Catholic women have become articulate and are a force of tremendous capacity.

"A recent survey, made at headquarters, of monthly letters of diocesan presidents, of correspondence and of reports, reveals an amazing picture of present wartime activities.

"Catholic laymen and Catholic laywomen will continue to give in greater numbers, service to all recognized war agencies and campaigns. The traditionally patriotic role of the American Catholic man or woman, does not permit us to isolate ourselves from any recognized war effort. Our organizations will be prominent, therefore, in the American Red Cross, in Committees to promote the sale of Defense Bonds, in Civilian Defense, and in other accredited agencies doing a special wartime work.

"Important in all this work, and an aid to coordination and planning, is a record of all Catholic war work. We should begin now to make and save that record—Catholics serving on USO Councils, NCCS Committees, cooperation with NCCS Centers, contributions to Chaplains' Aid Association, cooperation with American Red Cross, service on local and State Defense Councils, etc. Send a report to the Rochester Diocesan Council of Catholic Women regularly for release to the press and to N. C. W. headquarters.

"Organizations of Catholic women have a tremendous task before them—strengthening in every respect their normal program, aiding in extra war activities, and recording all these contributions. Today, as never before, is the worthwhileness of organization being challenged. Today, Catholic women must show they have profited by the experience they have gained in organization work and in smoothly gearing their program to Faith and Service—for God and Country. Our confidence is in you, the Catholic women's organizations of the country."

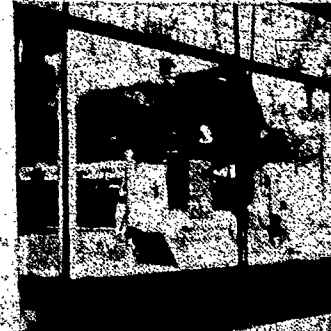
