

Bishop To Pontificate Easter Sunday At Cathedral

Special Music Program Prepared By Men's Seminary Choirs

Solemn Pontifical Mass marking the Holy and Joyous Feast of Easter will be celebrated by His Excellency, the Most Rev. James M. Kearney, D.D., Bishop of Rochester in Sacred Heart Cathedral, Sunday at 12:15 p. m.

Commemorating the glorious Resurrection of the Saviour of the World and His triumph over sin and death, the liturgy of the Feast of Easter will be carried out in detail at the Cathedral.

In the other churches of the diocese, the Solemnity and Joy of the Feast will be appropriately marked and special musical programs will be heard. (See Parish News). The musical program at the Cathedral appears below.

At the Cathedral, the Proper of the Mass will be sung by the St. Bernard's Seminary choir directed by the Rev. Benedict Ehmman, and the Ordinary of the Mass by Cathedral Men's Choir under the direction of Raymond J. Hasenauer.

The Cathedral three-hour services on Good Friday will open with the Mass of the Presanctified celebrated by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney at 12 noon.

Other noon services on Good Friday will take place at downtown churches of Old St. Mary's, St. Joseph's, Our Lady of Victory and St. Patrick's. To permit employees to attend the noon services, many business firms will allow time off from noon until 3 p. m. on Good Friday. Jacques Maritain To Speak At Aquinas Apr. 12

Coming to Rochester for the first time, on Sunday, April 12, is the great philosopher, Jacques Maritain. Regarded by many leading scholars as the greatest mind on earth today Maritain will give the last lecture this season in the Christian Culture Lecture Series at Aquinas Auditorium.

Now visiting professor at Princeton, Maritain was forced to remain in America after the fall of France. He is the world's greatest exponent of the thought of St. Thomas Aquinas.

His article on "Christian Humanism" in this month's issue of Fortune Magazine, is being widely discussed. Dorothy Thompson characterized Maritain in her "For France" copy some days ago as one "who writes with malice toward none."

Maritain lectures here on "The Philosophy of Action." A question period follows. The lecture is open to the public.

Married to the former Raissa Oumanoft, the Maritains' romance of the mind is deftly described in Raissa's "We Were Friends Together," recently published by Longmans Green.

Maritain has lectured at Rome, Toronto, Chicago, Paris, Oxford, Heidelberg, Geneva, Lyons, Virginia, Harvard, Columbia, Verona, Milan Universities, and before almost every famous learned society in the world. Maritain's great intellectual influence has reflected great the glory of Catholic thought.
