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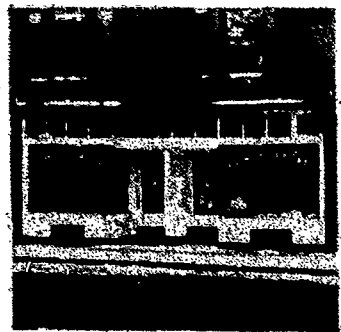

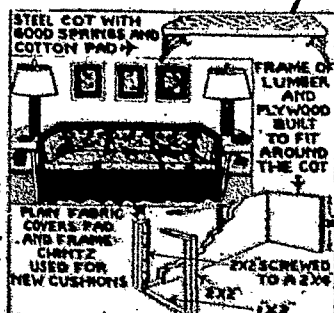

Listen to this week's Call to Youth program: Youth at Work in Wartime, Saturday, Apr. 11, at 1:30 P. M., EST, over WHAM and WBEN. This week's dramatization is entitled "Glimpses of Lelaure."

"Catholic Women in the Service of God and Country" is the theme of the twenty-first national convention of the National Council of Catholic Women, to be held in Hollywood, Florida, Apr. 18-22, and St. Augustine, Apr. 23.

The timeliness of the convention was stressed in an address by the Most Rev. Joseph P. Hurley, Bishop of St. Augustine and host to the convention, at a Board of Directors meeting of the St. Augustine Diocesan Council, who were planning the local details of the convention.

"The keynote of the whole convention," said Bishop Hurley, "will be a deeply supernatural one, because it will bring Catholic women of America together at a time when the fate of their country and religion hangs upon the issue of war."

Furthermore, this meeting will afford the opportunity to meet at a great National Shrine of Motherhood the Shrine of Nuestra Señora de la Leche y Buen Parto, at a time when mothers are praying for the boys in service. It will also be a pilgrimage of mothers to the Blessed Mother herself at a period in our history when those seeking to degrade motherhood are putting forth their best efforts.

The informal sessions on Saturday, Apr. 18, will be for leaders to discuss the contributions of Catholic women's groups to wartime activities. During the day, diocesan and deanery leaders of 65 diocesan council groups throughout the country will tell of the activities of their groups. Saturday evening, leaders of national organizations of Catholic women, affiliated with the National Council of Catholic Women will discuss the work they have been doing.

The sessions will open formally Sunday morning, Apr. 19 with a Pontifical High Mass at the Church of the Little Flower, Hollywood, Florida. An address on "Unity in This Crisis," keynote to the theme of the convention, will be given on Sunday evening by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Michael J. Ready, General Secretary, National Catholic Welfare Conference.

Main sessions of the program will be devoted to the National Catholic Welfare Conference in War Time, the National Catholic Community Service, the National Catholic School of Social Service, the Volunteer in the Field of Catholic Charities, inter-American relations, international relations, and post war life.

Delegates will enjoy a tour of Hollywood and environs as well as St. Augustine. A social feature of the program is Tea at Barry College, the newest Catholic woman's college in the United States.
