Red Cross Moves Milk For French Children

WASHINGTON, D. C. — The American Red Cross announced today that it is proceeding to make arrangements for necessary tonnage to transport to unoccupied France a cargo of canned milk and tins which will permit the continuance of its program of relief to French children in unoccupied France under the control and supervision of American Red Cross personnel.

During the past year this program has given relief to some 2,500,000 children under the age of 14 in unoccupied France.
