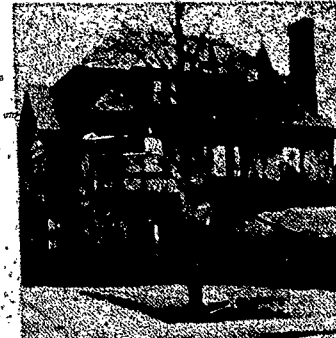

ROCHESTER DIOCESAN COUNCIL

National Council of Catholic Women

It is to be regretted that the rationing prevented many from out of town attending the meeting of the Board of Directors of the Rochester Diocesan Council, N. C. C. W., which was held in Elmira on Thursday last.

However, Mrs. Fred DeMuth of Corning was there with a delegation of eighteen from her deanery. Magr. John J. Leo was the celebrant of the High Mass at St. Peter and Paul's Church at 9:30 A. M., and addressed the present, dwelling on the importance of the National Council of Catholic Women and the great work it is accomplishing both for the Church and the Nation in our own diocese.

With his blessing on our deliberations we went into session at the Dunn Memorial, after a breakfast had been served those coming from out of town. Most interesting reports were given by deanery presidents. Defense work, Chaplains' Aid, Sewing for hospitals and library activities were emphasized. Miss Katherine Conolly's report on Elmira library activities was of particular interest.

The N. C. S. S. S.'s training of social workers, with truly Catholic standards, is doubly essential now. In response to a plea, in the name of Mrs. M. H. Keogh, co-chairman of the National Committee for the School, the Deanery Presidents pledged their continued support to this project, confided to our Catholic women by the Bishops of the United States in 1921.

Mrs. M. H. Keogh was named our diocesan candidate for the office of National Director from the Archdiocesan Province of New

York. (Election of National Directors will take place at the N. C. C. W. Convention opening on Saturday, Apr. 18, at Hollywood Beach Hotel, Florida, and continuing to Apr. 22.)

Miss Cecelia M. Yawman, Rochester Diocesan Council President, was elected to further represent the Diocese at the Convention.

Miss Mary A. Newsome, President of the Elmira Deanery Council, was chosen as alternate.

Two hundred were in attendance at the luncheon served at the Mark Twain Hotel, Miss Florence Callahan acting as toastmistress.

Rev. Leslie G. Whalen, Moderator of the Elmira Council, gave both invocation and benediction.

After a welcome from Miss Newsome and greetings by Miss Yawman, Mrs. Daniel F. Kennedy delighted with two musical selections which showed to advantage her beautiful voice. Mrs. John E. Baon accompanying her.

Rev. Joseph B. Toomey, Director of Catholic Charities in Binghamton, N. Y., gave a most inspiring talk on the necessity of present of realism in our outlook. Unselfishness and sacrifice must be our watchword if we would hope for victory and a just peace.

The singing of the Te Deum by those present was most impressive.

Mrs. W. H. Keogh, as National Director, has left to attend the Directors' Meeting preceding the National Convention.

Miss Cecelia M. Yawman, as Rochester Diocesan delegate, is leaving this morning.

On Apr. 23 there will be a pilgrimage to the Shrine of Our Lady of Motherhood at St. Augustine, Florida, where sessions on Family and Parent education will be held.

Much to our regret the Government has taken over the time of the Call to Youth program on Saturdays, and henceforth it will not be produced.

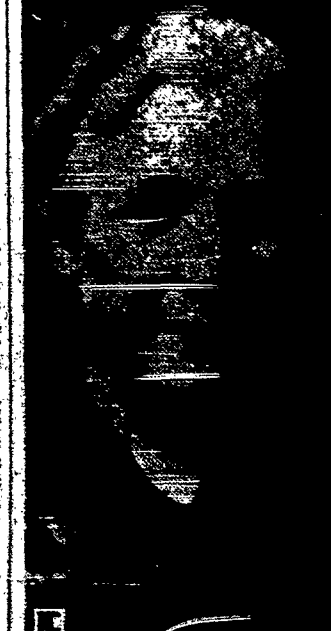
