Catholic Nurses Told To Use 'Weapon of Prayer'

Tremendous faith, strong Christian courage and "the powerful weapon of prayer" were held up by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney, as the needs to meet present problems of

The Bishop had earlier celebrated Holy Mass for the Catholic nurses in Old St. Mary's Shrine Church at which the nurses received Holy Communion in a body. "It seems a little thing to look out of the hospital room where you are trying to save lives and to look upon a world where human beings are being destroyed. It is hard to reconcile your sacrifices with such suffering outside unless you have faith," the Bishop said.

God permits such things to happen for some reason known to Himself, the nurses were told. Explains Three Needs

His Excellency said that today is needed "tremendous faith such as we never had before," courage to meet difficulties and disasters as part of God's plan and an amount of prayer ascending to Heaven greater than ever before.

That this nation need make no apology for wanting victory in a fight forced upon it, and that we are entering this war with no selfish spirit but to preserve the things in life we hold worthwhile, the Bishop said that maybe this furnishes a vocation for establishing a lasting and just peace. In this, he said, is the weapon of the spirit of prayer the most powerful.

His Excellency commended the Council for its first year of progress and success and for its fine leadership. It was pointed out that the Catholic nurse has a vocation and that her religion should color every thought, word and action because of religious teaching received.

Presiding at the breakfast was the Rev. Gregory Dugan, spiritual director of the Council who presented members of the National Council of Catholic Nurses from Geneva and Canandaigua in attendance and the student nurses, guests of the Council, from the seven city hospitals.

A word of welcome to the new members was extended by the Rev. John W. Brill, assistant spiritual director.

President Marie M. Flanagan announced that one of their members, Miss Francis Dolan was at Fort Ontario in the armed service and that nurses going into that service will be retained on the membership list.

Other officers at the speakers' table were: First Vice President Mary Haley, Second Vice-President Cyrilla Connor, Secretary Mary Rose Maley and Treasurer Loretta Dean. The program was in charge of Miss Margaret Donny, chairman, and Miss Harriett McAvoy, Co-chairman; musical pro-

gram, Miss Margaret Ryan, chairman. Patriotic and other numbers were sung under the direction of Vincent Mulvaney with Mrs. Perfecto Cobas at the piano.
