

BLESSING GIVEN NEW HOME FOR NUNS AT O. L. P. H.

Dedication of New Edifice Built by Outstanding Craftsmen

**Ceremony Dedicates
New Structure Well
Designed and Executed**

In a private ceremony at early 10 a. m., Wednesday morning, His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Keane, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, conducted the ceremony of blessing of the new residence for the Sisters of St. Joseph who teach at Our Lady of Perpetual Help School, Joseph Ave.

The Holy Mass was offered in the beautiful new chapel on the first floor of the newly completed convent building. The Holy Sacrifice was celebrated in rich new Gothic vestments of figured white damask trimmed with gold and blue orphreys and lining. Participating in the ceremony with the Bishop were the Rev. Lawrence E. Casey, vice chancellor; the Rev. Francis J. Hoehen, pastor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church and his assistant pastors, the Rev. Jacob R. Rauter and the Rev. William D. Tobin. Father Hoefen, who directed the construction of the new Sisters' residence, is being widely congratulated for its completeness in every detail.

The new building is of modern classic design. It harmonizes in every way possible with the stately church edifice which rises adjoining. It is newly equipped throughout and has the latest conveniences for the Sisters' use. The convent is constructed of cast stone and has a red asphalt shingle roof. All side walls and the entire roof are insulated. The building is heated from the church by underground tunnel running between the church and the convent. The large gold cross surmounting the roof over the front elevation calls attention of passerby to the fact that this is a building in which reside holy women devoted to the Cross of Christ. Architect for the new building was William L. Phillips with A. Charles Pioch, associate architect.

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Devotion-Inspiring Chapel Is Feature of New Convent

Furthering devotion in the new residence of the Sisters of St. Joseph of Our Lady of Perpetual Help School, now occupied on Joseph Avenue adjoining the church, is the beautiful little chapel, and its appointment especially designed for this chapel, on the first floor of the convent.

A striking oil painting of Christ the King provides the altar piece. The subject was painted in oils on canvas of light pastel shades, giving life to the altar. The artist is Guido Nincheri of Montreal. The colorful oil painting, in size proportioned to harmonize with the other appointments in the chapel, is spotlighted with colored lens which give a varying effect that arrests attention and is conducive to meditation and devotion.
