Requiem Mass For Mrs. Rauber

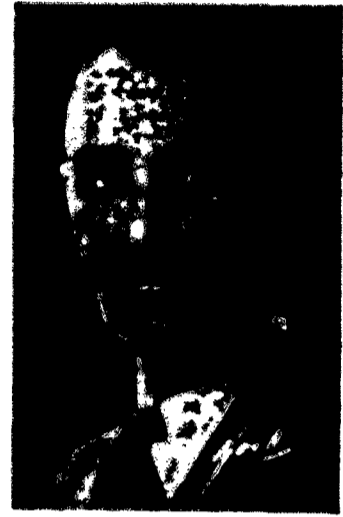

Arthur Barry Is Elected Rochester Trust Director

At the annual meeting of the stockholders of Rochester Trust and Safe Deposit Company, held at the company's offices, Tuesday, April 14, Arthur A. Barry, vice-president of Killwanger and Barry Realty

company, was elected a director, following in the footsteps of his brother, father and grandfather, the Barry family having had a notable record of service to the trust company.

The late Patrick Barry, pioneer Rochester Nurseryman and grandfather of the present director, was one of the founders of Rochester Trust and Safe Deposit Company as well as director of the parent company, the Safe Deposit Company of City of Rochester from 1864 on. The late William C. Barry, Sr., father of present director, was president of Rochester Trust from 1913 to 1916, as well as vice-president and director during the previous 24 years. The late William C. Barry, Jr., brother of present director, served as director of Rochester Trust for 19 years, from 1917 to 1936.

Charities Board Member Present director Arthur A. Barry is chairman of the board of East Side Savings Bank, member of Rochester Chamber of Commerce, Country Club of Rochester, honorary member of board of trustees of Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Children and director of Rochester Catholic Charities. He resides at 177 Rockingham Street.

Four other Rochester Trust directors were re-elected at the annual meeting for three-year terms expiring January 1945: William F. Strang, Richard M. Harris, Albert K. Chapman and Joseph F. Taylor. Three inspectors of election were also chosen: James C. Bristol, Stephen F. Pieper and Joseph A. Dryer.

Stockholders at Tuesday's annual meeting authorized the creation and issuance of 10,000 shares of Convertible Preferred Stock of the par value of \$50 per share, which will be offered first to present stockholders of the company on the basis of one share of preferred stock for each five shares of common stock. Present stockholders will be given until May 2, 1942, to exercise the right to subscribe and file the necessary warrants.

Amendments and additions to the company's by-laws, as ratified at the annual meeting, reduce the number of directors from 17 to a minimum of 12 and a maximum of 15, the exact number to be fixed by resolution of the board. Date of annual meeting was changed from second Tuesday in April to second Tuesday in January.

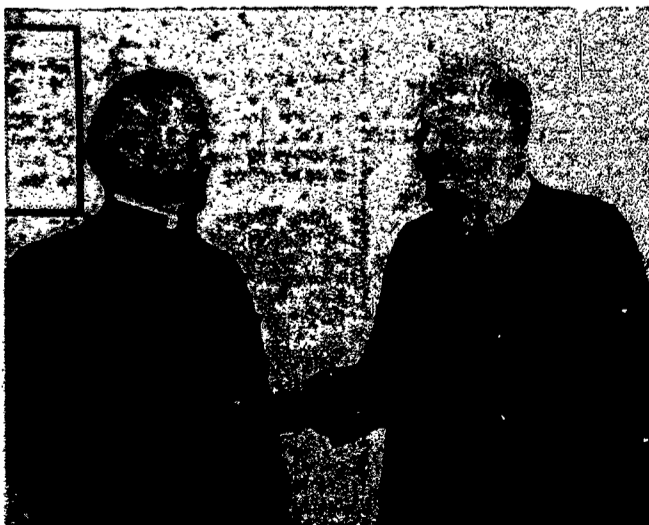
Students Broadcast On Pope's Peace Plan
