

# Geneva Men Offer 'Spiritual Bouquet' For Servicemen

GENEVA—More than 100 men of St. Stephen's and St. Francis de Sales parishes attended the 7 o'clock mass and received Holy Communion on Sunday at St. Francis de Sales Church, as a "spiritual bouquet" for the young men from the parishes who are in the armed forces of the United States.

Headed by the delegation of men was an honor guard of members of the Fourth Degree Assembly of the Knights of Columbus. Breakfast followed at the Hotel Seneca, the guest speaker being Rev. Albert Braun, C. S. R., who is connected with Our Lady of the Lake Mission and Retreat House on Lochland Road.

The program was arranged by Geneva Council of the Knights of Columbus.

A feature of the meeting was the collection of signatures of those attending. Photostatic copies will be sent to the men in the fighting forces in so far as it is possible to do so. It will remind the men that they are in the thoughts and prayers of the men at home. The collection of signatures was suggested by Frank Foley, Faithful Navigator of the Fourth Degree Assembly.

Louis L. McGuigan was toastmaster at the breakfast and in-

roduced Mayor Charles F. Nieder who was a guest.

City Judge Thomas A. Kane, chairman of arrangements, emphasized the need of spiritual benefits for the men who are serving the country.

Elvy Marshall, Grand Knight of Geneva Council, called attention to the 60th anniversary of the founding of the Knights of Columbus and asked for continued support of the men in the community.

Rev. William H. McPadden, pastor of St. Stephen's Church, described the spiritual bouquet as "a great act of charity" and expressed the hope that the men of both parishes would continue to remember the soldiers, sailors, airmen, and others in all of the private and public devotions in the parishes.

Father Braun who was then introduced gave an interesting account of the religious life of the people of Brazil where he spent several years. He also called the country "Uncle Sam's most devoted friend."

## Funeral Rites of the Week in Auburn

Leo Kane of 22 First Avenue, Town of Owaseo died suddenly of a heart attack at the Auburn City Hospital while he was visiting a friend who was a patient there. Mr. Kane was born in Newburyport, Mass., the son of the late Elias Anne Ensis and James H. Kane. For many years Mr. Kane was employed in an Auburn Shoe Plant as an expert patternmaker and designer. He was a communicant of St. Mary's Church, a member of the Auburn Lodge of Elks and of the Cayuga County Sportsmen's Association. His greatest hobby was fishing. During World War No. 1 Mr. Kane was a lieutenant-aviator with the RCAF. He is survived by his wife Mrs. Veronica Hatch Kane, one son, Leo Lawrence Kane of this city, and one sister, Miss Margaret Kane of Newburyport.

The funeral was held from his home in First Avenue and a Solemn High Mass of Requiem was celebrated at St. Mary's Church at 9 o'clock on Saturday morning, by Rev. Dennis Hickey, with Rev. Paul Hatch, brother-in-law of Mr. Kane as deacon, and Rev. Dr. William E. Cowen, sub-deacon. Burial was made in St. Joseph's Cemetery.

Mrs. LeRoy Mills of 2 Parker St., died at Mercy Hospital after a lingering illness. She was born in Pennsylvania but has lived in Auburn for the past eight years. Mrs. Mills was a communicant of St. Mary's Church. She is survived by her husband; two sons, Robert and Frederick of Auburn; her father, Ferdinand Crockenburg of Binghamton; five sisters, Mrs. Edward Sullivan of Scranton, Mrs. Charles Quinney of Clark Summit, Pa., Mrs. William Bittle and Mrs. Walter Cleary of Philadelphia, and Mrs. Paul Carl of Dearborn, Michigan; also seven brothers, Walter Crockenburg and Robert of Binghamton, Albert of Holley, Pa., Leo and Henry of New York City, Ferdinand of Endicott and Clifford of Philadelphia. The burial and the

funeral services took place in Honesdale, Pa.

Sister M. Theona, a member of the Franciscan Order and a former Auburnian died at St. Elizabeth's Hospital in Utica. She attended St. Mary's Parochial School. Sister Theona was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Robert Welch of Auburn. Her sister, Mrs. J. M. Toye of Auburn is the only survivor. Funeral services were held in Utica.

Many Auburnians were shocked and grieved when they learned of the death of Miss Norma Marguerite Harmon, 29, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. Joseph Harmon of Auburn. The tragic accident cost the lives of three persons and resulted in injuries to four others. The accident happened at the intersection of Transit Road and Route 20 in the Town of West Seneca, a suburb of Buffalo.

Miss Harmon was secretary for Dr. Roland J. Walker and Dr. William Havill of this city and well known and popular among the younger residents of Auburn. She was a communicant of Holy Family Church, a member of the League of the Sacred Heart of that parish and of the Flower Guild of Mercy Hospital.

Miss Harmon is survived by her parents, two sisters, Mrs. Francis Alexander of Auburn and Miss Helen Harmon of Waterloo; two brothers, Raymond J. Harmon of this city and Private Vernon Frederick Harmon, U. S. A. of Keesler Field, Miss. The funeral was held on Wednesday morning at the family home at 106 Janet Street and at Holy Family Church. Burial was in St. Mary's Cemetery, Skaneateles.

Martin J. Hanson, former Auburnian and veteran newspaper man, died at his home in Syracuse from a heart attack. He attended Holy Family School and was graduated from Auburn High School in the Class of 1904. From a young-

ster he was interested in newspaper work, being employed by an Auburn paper before his graduation from high school. He was a member of the staff of the Auburn Bulletin, city editor of the Bulletin and editor when the Bulletin

became the Auburn Citizen. He was a member of the Post-Standard up to the time of his death. Mr. Hanson was a charter member of the Auburn Lodge of Elks, past grand knight of Auburn Council, K. of C. and of the Fourth Degree

of the order. His only survivors are his wife and a brother Emory, who is spending some time at Hollywood, Florida. Funeral services were held in Syracuse and burial was made in St. Joseph's Cemetery, Auburn.
