

Catholic Flier In Burma, Missing

LOS ANGELES.—Lieut. William McGarry, of the American Volunteer squadron in Burma, one of the first Loyola University fliers to see service in the present war, has been reported missing after a raid on Chingma in which he and four other pilots destroyed ten Japanese planes and badly smashed ten others on Mar. 24.

is believed it was pierced by machine-gun bullets. The squadron rallied around him and convoyed him back toward Burma but near the frontier he dropped from formation, rolled the plane on its back, slid the hatch and bailed out at about 1,500 feet. His comrades saw him land safely in a clearing, gather his chute and take cover

under a clump of trees, apparently uninjured.

Lieut. McGarry, member of a prominent Catholic family, is an artist and designed the famed Adam and Eve emblem of the American Volunteer's First Pursuit Squadron.

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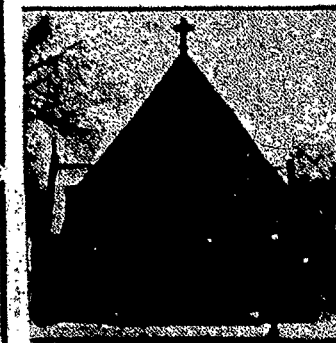
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Citizenship Classes Show Huge Growth

The "W. P. A. Citizenship Education Project" reports an astounding growth of its free citizenship program, according to Mr. W. E. McCarthy, District Supervisor, Service Division.

On Apr. 15 there were a total of 28 class centers, 114 classes and a weekly attendance of 1,800 alien students, Mr. McCarthy reports. The keen interest in citizenship preparation, on the part of Rochester aliens is evidenced by the fact that on Jan. 1, there were but six W. P. A. Citizenship centers, 30 classes and a weekly attendance of less than 400 aliens. Mr. McCarthy reports that new classes and new school and neighborhood class centers are opening up rapidly and predicts a mid-summer alien student body of from three thousand to a possible four thousand students. The present classes are located as follows:
