## CITY WELCOMES HOLY NAME UNION

### Normal Graduates Get Nazareth Degree

Graduates of Nazareth Normal School who complete the fourth year of study at Nazareth will hereafter receive the degree, Bachelor of Education from Nazareth College, in accordance with the pronouncement following, of Dr. J. Hillis Miller, Associate Commissioner in charge of Higher and Professional Education, in his communication of Mar. 23, 1942, addressed to Sister Anna de Paul, Principal of Nazareth Normal.

"I herewith advise you that on this date the New York State Department of Education has registered the combined four-year curriculum to be offered at Nazareth Normal School and Nazareth College for the preparation of Sister teachers of the elementary parochial schools leading to the degree Bachelor of Education."

By the action of the Board of Regents of Jan. 16, 1942 the graduates of the general elementary curriculum of the State's nine Normal Schools will henceforth receive baccalaureate degrees.

Sister graduates of Nazareth Normal serve not only in Rochester diocesan schools but in some

diocesan schools of New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, Maryland, Alabama, Michigan and Puerto Rico.

Just before the final onset of the present world crisis, one of its graduates found her way into Lithuania, to give to orphan children there what America had so bountifully bestowed upon her here.

Although just a small unit Nazareth Normal has endeavored to render service in the home and in the mission field by making the elementary Sister teacher "better fit for teaching and developing the child mind. This endowment Nazareth Normal brings as it enters into collaboration with the department of education of Nazareth College.

### Pontifical Mass Opens 10th Annual Sessions; Priest-Editor To Talk

The Rev. John W. Lynch of St. John The Baptist Church, Syracuse, will be the principal speaker at the luncheon meeting to be held in connection with the tenth annual convention of the Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Union in the Powers Hotel on Sunday, May 3. This announcement was made last night by Frank E. Wolfe, President of the Diocesan Union.

Father Lynch is nationally known as a speaker, author and editor. For several years he conducted the Catholic Radio Hour at Binghamton. He is at present editor of the Catholic Sun, the official newspaper of the Syracuse Diocese. He is author of several works including "A Woman Wrapped in Silence" which through a recent publication is already in its fifth edition. He is one of the most gifted pulpit orators in the Syracuse Diocese and is expected to bring to the convention a message which will prove an inspiration to all that hear him.

With the naming of Father Lynch as the luncheon speaker, plans for the convention are complete.

The convention will open at 11:00 A. M. with Solemn Pontifical Mass at Holy Redeemer Church which will be celebrated by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney. The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles F. Shay and the Rev. F. W. Stauder will be Deacons of Honor. Rev. A. F. Fiorack, Deacon; Rev. Walter Carron, Sub-Deacon, and Rev. Lawrence E. Casey and Rev. Edward Lyons, Masters of Ceremony. The sermon will be delivered by Bishop Kearney.

Luncheon at the Powers will follow the Mass. Father Lynch will speak at the luncheon.

This will be followed by the convention sessions proper. The Rev. Harry C. Graham, O.P., of New York City, National Director of the Holy Name Society, will be the principal speaker at the convention meeting. The program is also to include a series of panel discussions to be conducted by Dr. James N. Estham of the Catholic Speakers' Bureau, Rev. John A. Reddington of St. Bernard's Seminary, and the Rev. Joseph E. Vogt of the St. Joseph House of Hospitality.

Each Holy Name Society in the diocese is entitled to be represented.

### Msgr. Dangelmayr Named Dallas Auxiliary Bishop

WASHINGTON, (NC) The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Augustino Dangelmayr, Vicar General of the Diocese of Dallas, has been named by His Holiness, Pope Pius XII, to be Titular Bishop of Olba and Auxiliary Bishop of Dallas. It is announced in word received here by His Excellency, the Most Rev. Amleto Giovanni Cicognani, Apostolic Delegate to the United States.

Bishop-Designate Dangelmayr is a native of the Diocese of Dallas, having been born at Muenster, Texas, Dec. 11, 1898. His parents, Joseph and Theresa Mueck Dangelmayr, still reside in Muenster. The Bishop-Designate attended Subiaco College, Subiaco, Ark.; St. Mary's Seminary, La Porte, Texas, and Kenrick Seminary, St. Louis. He was ordained to the priesthood on June 10, 1923, in the Cathedral of the Sacred Heart, Dallas, by the Most Rev. Joseph Patrick Lynch, Bishop of Dallas, whose Auxiliary he now becomes.

### U. S. Protestant Propaganda Hampering Inter-American Relations, Says Archbishop

RIO DE JANEIRO, (NC) — Widespread Protestant propaganda in Brazil is hampering relations between the peoples of this country and the United States, the Most Rev. Antonio Gabriel, Archbishop of Rio Horizonte, declares in a letter to Jefferson Caffery, United States Ambassador to Brazil.

The Archbishop states in the course of his letter, which deals with Pan-Americanism and the Catholic Church in Brazil, that such Protestant propaganda is attributable to missionaries from the United States and generally serves to impede Brazil-United States relations.

### Elmira Parish To Observe Golden Jubilee In May

St. John the Baptist Church begins its golden jubilee celebration on next Sunday and will continue the celebration of its fiftieth birthday through the month of May.

On May 1, 1892, Bishop Ryan of Buffalo, came to Elmira, and with elaborate ceremonies blessed the new church.

The parish itself dates back to 1858 when the cornerstone for a little church building was laid on Dickenson St. The church was completed in 1858 under the pastorate of Rev. Serge Schouepnikoff. In 1889 the church was leveled to the ground by fire and after services were held for some time in the school-house on Benjamin Street, new property was bought on the corner of Lake and Second Streets. The corner stone for the new church was laid in 1891, the Rev. A. Geisenhoff then being pastor.

Fr. Stemmler Named  
In 1903 the Rev. John B. Stemmler was appointed pastor and he has served in this capacity since. During the pastorate of Father Stemmler extensive improvements were made in the church, these shortly after his arrival. Later the present rectory was purchased. In 1937 the interior of the church was entirely remodeled and redecorated. Today the church stands as

one of the most beautiful churches in the Southern Tier.

The parish boasts of the oldest Catholic organization in Elmira, the St. John's Benevolent Association. Also active in the church are the Sodality the Altar Society, the Holy Name Society and Boy and Girl Scout troops.

The golden jubilee will not be marked by a formal ceremony due to the illness of Father Stemmler. However, the Rev. Raymond G. Heisel, assistant pastor, has arranged to mark the occasion by fittingly decorating the church with gold hangings, and rich floral displays on the altars. Jubilee sermons will be preached on the Sundays of May and on May 24 a volume, "Fifty Years for God and Country" will be distributed.

The book will contain pictures and articles illustrating the history of the parish. Content matter is now being compiled by Father Heisel.

Springfield, Ill. A block of property and the residence of Mrs. Edna Godley acquired by Springfield Junior College, conducted by the Ursuline Sisters, has been dedicated by the Rev. Benedict Killacky, instructor of religion and philosophy at the college.

### Belgian Cardinal Hits Food Profiteers

LONDON, (NC)—His Eminence Joseph Cardinal Van Ropy, Archbishop of Malines and Primate of Belgium, in a pastor letter, scores food profiteers and pleasure seekers in these times of crisis. Information received here states:

"All undue gain in the sale of foodstuffs is a crying offense against justice and charity," His Eminence says. "Those who possess more than is necessary are bound to yield up to those who are worse off."

The Cardinal condemns vulgar amusement in these times and even criticizes dancing, as "deserving of the reprobation of all decent people" because of the present situation. "It is an offense against the national conscience to abandon oneself to pleasure," His Eminence adds.

### SCHOLARSHIP EXAMINATIONS

Girls graduating from the Catholic elementary schools of Rochester and vicinity this June, and in the upper scholarship rank of their class, are invited to compete for a scholarship by the Academy of the Sacred Heart, Nazareth Academy, and Our Lady of Mercy High School.

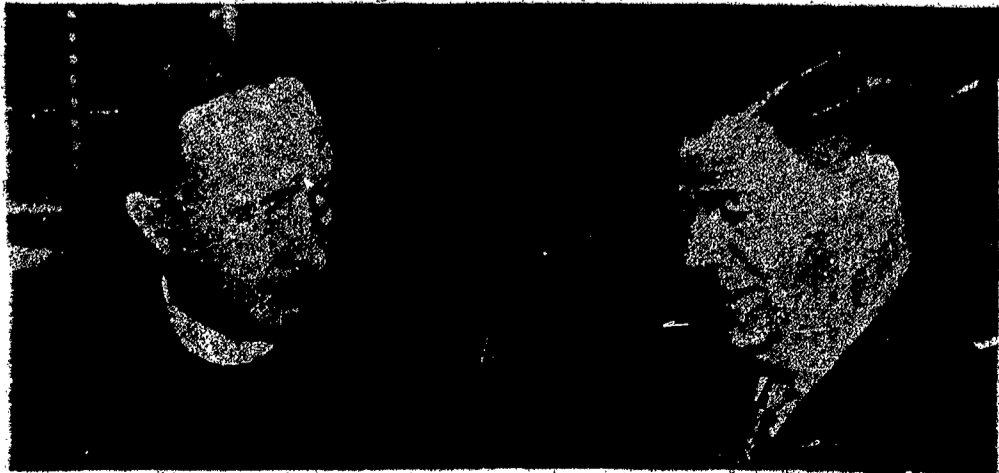
Girls of the Eighth Grade attending parochial schools in Rochester recommended for scholarship of an "A" Grade by the principal of their school, are eligible to try the examination at the Academy of the Sacred Heart, on Saturday morning, May 9. They should present themselves at the school at 9:00 A. M. on the morning of the test. Each girl should be provided with a small picture of herself to be affixed to her examination paper.

Girls of the Eighth Grade attending schools in Rochester who are recommended by the principal as having scholarship ability are eligible to try the scholarship examination at Nazareth Academy, on Saturday, May 16. They should present themselves at the school at 9:00 A. M.

Girls of the Eighth Grade attending Catholic schools in Rochester, or members of vicinity parishes, who desire to compete are eligible to try the examination at Our Lady of Mercy High, Saturday, May 23. They should present themselves at the school at 9:00 A. M.

Graduates interested may receive further information from the Principal of the school they attend or from the Catholic Education Office, 30 Chestnut St.
