### U. S. Protestant Propaganda Hampering Inter-American **Relations**, Says Archbishop

RIO DE JANEIRO. - (NC) ---Widespread Frotestant propaganda in Brazii is hampering relations between the peoples of this cour-ity and the United States, the Most Rev. Antonio Gabral, Archbishop of Brio Horizonte, declares in a jet to Jefferson Caffery, United States Ambassador to Brazil.

Brazil. The Archbishop states in the course of his leter, which deals with Pan-Americanism and the Catholic Church in Brazil, that such Protestant propaganda is at-tributable to missionaries from the United States and generally serves to impede Brazil-United States re-lations.

## **B**elgian Cardinal **Hits Food Profiteers**

LONDON -(NC)-His Eminance Joseph Cardinal Van Roey, Archhishop of Malines and Primate of Belginm, in a pastor letter, scores food profiteers and pleasure seek-ers in these times of crisis, infor-mation received here states.

"All undue gain in the sale of foodstuffs is a crying offense against justice and charity." His Eminence says. "Those who pos-sess more than is necessary are bound to yield up to those who are worse off."

The Cardinal condemns vulgar aniusement in these times and even criticizes dancing, as "deserving of the reprodution of all decent peo-ple" because of the present situa-tion, "It is an offense against the national conscience to abandon enesoif to pleasure," His Eminence adds.


