

# Ticket Sales For Mass Film Spurred By Parish Groups

At a special committee meeting of the Catholic Workers at St. Joseph's House of Hospitality, plans were discussed for the promotion of the sale of tickets for The Eternal Gift, to be shown at the Regent Theatre during the week beginning Thursday, May 14.

The Eternal Gift is a full-length feature picture of a solemn High Mass which has been produced by the Servite Fathers. Msgr. Fulton J. Sheen, well-known Catholic Hour speaker, is the narrator for the film.

The picture is being shown here under the auspices of St. Joseph's House of Hospitality 402 South Ave. St. Joseph's House will receive a percentage of the profit from the sale of tickets sold through them, and this money will be used to provide a chapel for the transients who are daily served breakfast and supper at St. Joseph's House.

In regard to the presentation of this picture, the Most Rev. James F. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester, has declared "The presentation of the motion picture study of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass entitled The Eternal Gift is welcome news to all religious-minded people of the city. For Catholics it furnishes a very interesting study of the liturgy so dear to their hearts, for those not of our faith, it furnishes an exposition, in interesting form, of the Liturgy instituted by Christ centuries ago. For our young school folks especially, it will have outstanding value. I know that parents will take advantage of this excellent opportunity for their children to learn in an impressive way about The Eternal Gift."

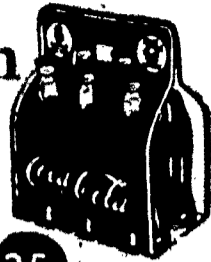
## ENDS DISCUSSION
