

25 Teams In Field As CYO Grammar School League Opens Season

Twenty-five grammar school softball teams are entered in the C. Y. O. Grammar Softball League, which gets under way on Friday, May 1. This is the largest number of teams ever entered in the history of the league.

The Southern Division is comprised of twelve teams with each team playing the other teams once. The Northern Division has thirteen teams in their schedule with each team playing the other teams once, also. The games will be played on Tuesdays at four o'clock and on Fridays at three-thirty o'clock.

A six-months' membership in the Columbus Youth Association will be given each week to the player who, through the reports of the umpires, makes the best play of the week. To the boy getting the greatest number of home runs during the season will be given a six-months' membership to the Columbus Youth Association.

The Championship Team will be decided by the winning team of the Southern Division playing the winner of the Northern Division. The Championship Team, as a token of their prowess, cooperation and hard playing, will be given a large banner inscribed with their name as the winners of the C. Y. O. Grammar Softball League, sweater emblems to match the banner for each player of the team, one dozen softballs and a six-months' membership to the Columbus Youth Association for fifteen players on the team.

Parochiallympic Meet Won By St. Monica's

When the final scores were tallied, St. Monica's team took first place as champions of 1942, followed closely by Our Lady of Perpetual Help. Of special note was the swimming of Fred Sohn of Our Lady of Perpetual Help who nearly broke the existing Parochial School record for the 75-yard free style and that of Victor Yawman of St. Boniface whose 17.5 in the backstroke event pared two seconds off the previous record.

Wings Open With Baltimore

Baseball, King of American sports, returns to the Rochester Red Wing Stadium, Thursday, April 30, when the Red Wings will open the 1942 season with the Baltimore Orioles as opponents.

The Red Wings of 1942 appear to be as good as the starting team of 1941 which proved to be a pennant-contender for the greater part of the season.

President Oliver French is solidly behind Kaufmann in his plans to give Rochester another winner. Rochester won in 1936 and, during 42 years of Class AA ball here, Rochester teams have finished first 11 times, a record better than that of any other team in the league.

The Orioles are scheduled to play single games here on Friday and Saturday, May 2 and 3. The Saturday game will be marked by the first 1942 appearance of the Knott Hole Gang and it is certain that a huge crowd of vociferous young Americans will be in their accustomed sections of the stadium, shouting their battle cry, "We want a Hit" and rooting lustily for a Red Wing victory.

The Newark Bears, 1941 pennant winners and favorites to repeat this season, come to town Sunday, May 3, for the first doubleheader of the season. Given reasonably good weather, the fans will pack the park for that early season season.
