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## St. John's Church Marks Golden Jubilee

### Pontifical Mass To Open 10th Holy Name Union Convention In Rochester

The Rev. John W. Lynch of St. John The Baptist Church, Syracuse, will be the principal speaker at the luncheon meeting to be held in connection with the tenth annual convention of the Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Union in the Powers Hotel on Sunday, May 3. This announcement was made last night by Frank E. Wolfe, President of the Diocesan Union.

Father Lynch is nationally known as a speaker, author and editor. For several years he conducted the Catholic Radio Hour at Binghamton. He is at present editor of the Catholic Sun, the official newspaper of the Syracuse Diocese. He is author of several works including "A Woman Wrapped in Silence," which though a recent publication is already in its fifth edition. He is one of the most gifted pulpit orators in the Syracuse Diocese and is expected to bring to the convention a message which will prove an inspiration to all that hear him.

With the naming of Father Lynch as the luncheon speaker, plans for the convention are complete.

The convention will open at 11:00 A. M. with Solemn Pontifical Mass at Holy Redeemer Church which will be celebrated by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney. The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles F. Shy and the Rev. F. W. Stauder will be Deacons of Honor. Rev. A. F. Florack, Deacon. Rev. Walter Carron, Sub-Deacon, and Rev. Lawrence B. Casey and Rev. Edward Lyons, Masters of Ceremony. The sermon will be delivered by Bishop Kearney.

Luncheon at the Powers will follow the Mass. Father Lynch will speak at the luncheon.

This will be followed by the convention sessions proper. The Rev. Harry C. Graham, O.P., of New York City, National Director of the Holy Name Society, will be the principal speaker at the convention meeting. The program is also to include a series of panel discussions to be conducted by Dr. James N. Eastham of the Catholic Speakers' Bureau, Rev. John A. Reddington of St. Bernard's Seminary, and the Rev. Joseph E. Vogt of the St. Joseph House of Hospitality.

Each Holy Name Society in the diocese is entitled to be represented at the convention by four delegates and its Spiritual Director. Because this year's meeting celebrates the tenth anniversary of formation of the Diocesan Union, an invitation is being extended also to all officers of Holy Name Societies in the diocese to attend this year's sessions. Reservations for the luncheon must be in by Friday, May 1. They may be made through James G. D'Amico, 186 Lyell Ave., Rochester, who is Chairman of the luncheon committee.

### Msgr. Danglmayr Named Dallas Auxiliary Bishop

WASHINGTON, (NC)—The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Augustine Danglmayr, Vicar General of the Diocese of Dallas, has been named by His Holiness, Pope Pius XII, to be Titular Bishop of Oliba and Auxiliary Bishop of Dallas. It is announced in word received here by His Excellency, the Most Rev. Amleto Giovanni Cicognani, Apostolic Delegate to the United States.

Bishop-Designate Danglmayr is a native of the Diocese of Dallas, having been born at Muenster, Texas, Dec. 11, 1898. His parents, Joseph and Theresa Muck Danglmayr, still reside in Muenster.

The Bishop-Designate attended Subiaco College, Subiaco, Ark.; St. Mary's Seminary, La Porto, Texas, and Kenrick Seminary, St. Louis. He was ordained to the priesthood on June 10, 1922, in the Cathedral of the Sacred Heart, Dallas, by the Most Rev. Joseph Patrick Lynch, Bishop of Dallas, whose Auxiliary he now becomes.

### U. S. Protestant Propaganda Hampering Inter-American Relations, Says Archbishop

RIO DE JANEIRO (NC)—Widespread Protestant propaganda in Brazil is hampering relations between the peoples of this country and the United States, the Most Rev. Antonio Gabriel, Archbishop of Belo Horizonte, declares in a letter to Jefferson Caffery, United States Ambassador to Brazil.

The Archbishop states in the course of his letter, which deals with Pan-Americanism and the Catholic Church in Brazil, that such Protestant propaganda is attributable to missionaries from the United States and generally serves to impede Brazil-United States relations.

### Sermons, Souvenir Book To Commemorate 50 Years of Parish

St. John the Baptist Church begins its golden jubilee celebration on next Sunday and will continue the celebration of its fiftieth birthday through the month of May.

On May 1, 1892, Bishop Ryan of Buffalo, came to Elmira, and with elaborate ceremonies blessed the new church.

The parish itself dates back to 1846 when the decorations for a little church building was laid on Dickenson St. The church was completed in 1868 under the pastorate of Rev. Sergei Schouppakoff. In 1888 the church was leveled to the ground by fire and after services were held for some time in the school-house on Benjamin Street, new property was bought on the corner of Lake and Second Streets. The corner stone for the new church was laid in 1891, the Rev. A. Geisenhoff then being pastor.

Fr. Stenwiler Named

In 1903 the Rev. John B. Stenwiler was appointed pastor and he has served in this capacity since. During the pastorate of Father Stenwiler extensive improvements were made in the church, these shortly after his arrival. Later the present rectory was purchased. In 1937 the interior of the church was entirely remodeled and redecorated. Today the church stands as one of the most beautiful churches in the Southern Tier.

The parish boasts of the oldest Catholic organization in Elmira, the St. John's Benevolent Association. Also active in the church are the Sodality, the Altar Society, the Holy Name Society and Boy and Girl Scout troops.

The golden jubilee will not be marked by a formal ceremony due to the illness of Father Stenwiler. However, the Rev. Raymond G. Heisel, assistant pastor, has arranged to mark the occasion by fittingly decorating the church with gold hangings, and rich floral displays on the altars. Jubilee sermons will be preached on the Sundays of May and on May 24 a volume, "Fifty Years for God and Country" will be distributed.

The book will contain pictures and articles illustrating the history of the parish. Content matter is now being compiled by Father Heisel.

### Normal Graduates Get Nazareth Degree

Graduates of Nazareth Normal School who complete the fourth year of study at Nazareth will hereafter receive the degree, Bachelor of Education from Nazareth College, in accordance with the pronouncement following, of Dr. J. Hillis Miller, Associate Commissioner in charge of Higher and Professional Education, in his communication of Mar. 28, 1942, addressed to Sister Anna de Paul, Principal of Nazareth Normal.

"I herewith advise you that on this date the New York State Department of Education has registered the combined four-year curriculum to be offered at Nazareth Normal School and Nazareth College for the preparation of Sister teachers of the elementary parochial schools leading to the degree Bachelor of Education."

By the action of the Board of Regents of Jan. 16, 1942, the graduates of the general elementary curriculum of the State's nine Normal Schools will henceforth receive baccalaureate degrees.

Sister graduates of Nazareth Normal serve not only in Rochester diocesan schools but in some diocesan schools of New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, Maryland, Alabama, Michigan and Puerto Rico.

Just before the final onset of the present world crisis, one of its graduates found her way into Lithuania, to give to orphan children there what America had so bounteously bestowed upon her here.

Although just a small unit, Nazareth Normal has endeavored to render service to the home and in the mission field by making the elementary Sister teacher "better fit" for reaching and developing the child mind. This endowment Nazareth Normal brings as it enters into collaboration with the department of education of Nazareth College.

### Civil Air Patrol Exhibition At Ithaca, First of Kind, In Charge of Fr. Cleary

ITHACA—Rev. Donald M. Cleary, Ithaca's "Flying Chaplain," has been appointed chairman of the Civil Air Patrol Exhibition to be held Sunday, May 3, at Ithaca Airport. This exhibition which will include graduation exercises, is the first of its kind in the country and has aroused the interest of all CAP officials.

Members of the Squadron have completed 20 hours of first aid, 20 hours of military drill, preliminary instruction in navigation, meteorology, radio telephone, and various other subjects, and are now ready for more advanced ground work and flying technique. Thirty members of the group are eligible to receive their CAP identification cards. These awards will be made by Group Comdr. Harold E. Cobb of Syracuse.

The two-hour program will begin at 2:30 P. M. with Lieut. Hugh Coalson, Jr., of the U. S. Army Reserve, marching the candidates to the reviewing stand on the west side of the runway. Squadron Comdr. Eimer T. Hurst will present the unit to Commander Cobb.

Nine ships will participate in the formation flying which will be followed by radio telephone communication between the ships and the air base. These conversations will be carried over the public address system. The Accuracy Bombing demonstration is under the direction of Louis A. Smith, and Roland Alexander is in charge of the Mock Air Raid. In connection with this event, a simulated air crash will offer an opportunity for members of the class to show the results of their first aid classes.

### 11 Sets of Brothers Noted On 96-Star Parish Service Flag

KANKAKEE, Ill.—Eleven sets of brothers are represented on the 96-star service flag of St. Patrick's Parish here. The flag, recently dedicated, also contains a star for the assistant pastor of St. Patrick's, now Chaplain Leonard J. McMansmon, Air Corps chaplain at Selfridge Field, Mich. One nurse is represented, Lieut. Dorothy Longorgan, serving in an army hospital.
