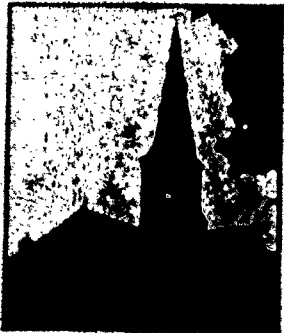

C.D.A. COMMUNION SUNDAY

May Devotions

May Devotions in honor of the Blessed Mother began Friday evening, May 1, in St. Ann's Church and will continue to be held each evening during the month. The devotions, which are held at 7:30 o'clock every evening, consist of recitation of the Rosary and Litany of the Blessed Virgin, also Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

The Rev. Andrew Dissett has appealed to all parishioners to attend the May devotions as a petition to the Queen of Peace for the welfare of the men of the parish in the armed service, and the intention of a just and speedy world peace.

Holy Name Society
