Holland Catholics Reported As Standing Firm Against Nazis

NEW YORK - The Nazi invaders of Holland lately have been giving "disquieting attention" to Catholic activities in that occupied country. It is stated in the current issue of "Netherlands News," fortnightly bulletin published here by the Netherlands Information Bureau.

Nazi newspapers, the bulletin says, accuse the Catholic clergy of Holland of advising their congregations openly to reject the Nazi philosophy, both political and religious. They further charge, the bulletin states, that Catholics have "steadfastly refused to cooperate in the Winter Relief campaign." One of these newspapers, De Waag, is quoted as having stated that Catholics have gradually grown more antagonistic toward the "New Order" and have repeatedly

disregarded "well-meant warnings."

"In the schools, too," the bulletin says, "the Catholics of the Netherlands refuse to bow down to Nazi influences. When the chief inspector of schools in two southern provinces - which are mainly Catholic in their make-up - discussed with 17 of his inspectors the possibility of demanding complete cooperation in training for the New Order instead of slyly neutrality, passive resistance and sabotage, he was supported by only one inspector. The remaining 16 voiced their opinion through a spokesman who said: 'We are confirmed Catholics. We have taken an oath of the constitution to which we shall adhere. We shall never do anything contrary to our convictions as Catholics.'"
