NOTES FROM NATIONAL CONVENTION NCCW

Hollywood, Florida, April 28-30
The general theme of the convention was "Catholic Women in the Service of God and Country."
An excellent resume of the resolutions adopted at the convention is to be found in the article by Katherine McKiver in last week's CATHOLIC COURIER, Page 2.
The most important sessions for leaders preceding the convention proper were held on Saturday, April 27 and were attended by NCCW Directors, the heads of National Organizations of Catholic Women, and Diocesan Presidents. Among them were Mrs. M. H. Keogh and Miss Cecilia M. Yawman of the Rochester Diocese.
The necessity for Unity in Prayer and Service was stressed by Most Rev. Ernest M. Walsh, Bishop of Charleston and Assistant Bishop of the Department of Lay Organizations, National Catholic Welfare Conference.
It was emphasized that our work is not the work of one woman or of one society but of every Catholic and every Catholic society in the United States.
Prominent leaders at the convention, well known to our Rochester women were: Miss Margaret T. Lynch, NCCW executive secretary; Miss Agnes G. Regan, Miss Mary G. Hawk, Miss Anne Sarachon Hooley, Miss Mary C. Duffy, Grand Regent of C. D. of A., Mrs. Mary Filser Lohr, national president of the Catholic Women's Union, Miss Dorothy Willman, national secretary of the Supreme Ladies Auxiliaries of the Knights of St. John.
Masses were celebrated daily at Hollywood Beach Hotel during the convention week: Monday for the Holy Father; Tuesday for World Peace; Wednesday for all living and deceased members of the N.C.W. It was most edifying to see prac-

tically all of our women approaching the altar rail daily.

Thursday after the night trip to St. Augustine, many received Holy Communion at the Shrine of Our Lady of Motherhood, where Mass was celebrated by Most Rev. Joseph P. Hurley, Bishop of St. Augustine.

At the breakfast later at the Bennett Hotel, Rev. Paul Tanner, Director of the Youth Department NCCW and Rev. Edw. Schmiedler, O.S.B., of the Family Life Bureau, gave stirring addresses.

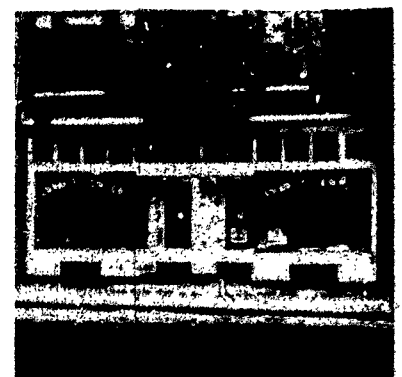

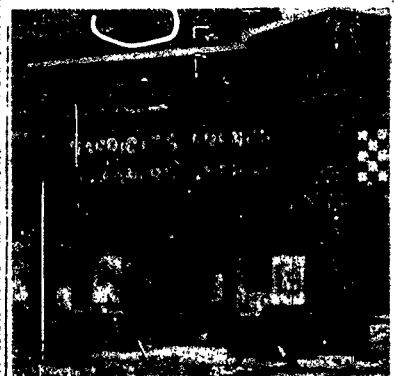

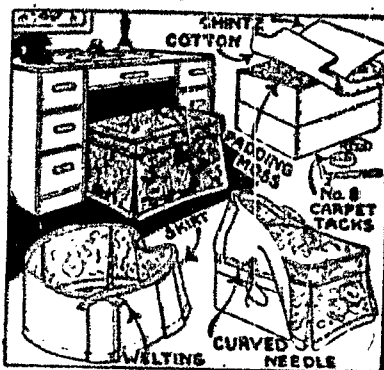
